THE P. E. I. CAR FERRY'S FORWARD PROPELLOR.

(Canadian Railway and Marine World.)

In the description in the Canadian Railway and Marine World for September, of the car ferry steamship which is being built at Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, to run between Cape Tormentine, N. B., and Carleton Point, P. E. I., it was stated that a feature of the vessel which will be a new one on icebreaking ships in Canada, will be the forward screw, a feature which was first introduced on the Russian icebreaker Ermack. We were aware, however, that the Ermack had been altered, that she had returned to the Tyne where her forepart was cut away completely, together with her propeller and its tube and that she had been fitted with a new bow, we communicate with Sir W. G. Armstrong, Witworth & Co., who built the Ermack and who are building the P. E. I. Ferry and they have replied as follows: "The Ermack was originally built with a forward propeller, with a view to service in the Baltic, where it was always to be found there it was found to be of considerable value in breaking up the pack ice. After a certain amount of work in the Baltic it was decided to attack the ice within the Arctic Region, and on the first voyage that part it was found that the bow propeller, useful though it was in the Baltic, was a positive hindrance to the vessel when attacking field ice, which often attained a thickness of 14 ft. and it was of exceptional density and strength. It was therefore decided to take it off and alter the form of the bow.

"The car ferry is not, of course, intended for service amongst ice such as that encountered by the Ermack in the Arctic Circle, but will constantly have to face conditions which are more analogous to those of the Baltic Sea, where the bow propeller was found, not only in the Ermack, but in two later icebreakers—the Sampo and the Tarmo—to be of great value. Apart from this, the special manoeuvring which would be required in this vessel will make a forward propeller extremely useful especially as we foresee circumstances in which owing to the jam of ice in the landing ports, it may easily be that the two stern propellers are stopped, and the forward propeller will then be available to extricate the ship from her position and enable her to move out so as to attack the ice again.

"We have had experience of railway work amongst the ice on the large railway ferry steamship Balka which—as you are aware—carried the whole of the trains of the Siberian Railroad across the great inland lake after which it is named, until the railway round the edge was completed. It is this experience upon which we have drawn in designing the car ferry."

FORGOTTEN WILL AND RAISED FUNDS.

TORONTO, Nov. 9.—When Cecil Irwin was placed under arrest in the offices of the Trust and Guarantee Company Saturday afternoon, what is believed to be one of the cleverest swindles which has ever been perpetrated in Toronto was brought to light. By the work of Irwin, the Trust and Guarantee Company within the last few weeks has lost nearly \$5,000. Recently Irwin's mother died and left him a small legacy, which he quickly spent. Shortly after her death he started a small business in the Dineen building, selling stationery supplies to downtown offices. It is alleged that recently he drew up a bogus will in which he and his father were named as executors. Under the terms of this will he was a beneficiary to the extent of \$15,000 in the shape of real estate throughout the city. Irwin then drew up an affidavit, it is claimed, by which his father withdrew his powers as executor, leaving Irwin with the power to administer the estate. With these documents he went to the trust company and explained to them that owing to the fact that he was not conversant with business methods he would like them to handle the estate for him. After viewing the documents that Irwin presented to them they accepted the administration of the

estate. Shortly after they had done so Irwin asked if he could obtain \$3,000, as he was badly in need of funds. The trust company acceded to his request.

A few days afterwards he again asked for money, obtaining \$525. When this had been spent he returned to the office of the company and was able to obtain \$1,000. Irwin's requests for money had been too frequent, and the company became suspicious. They then learned that they had been swindled. A warrant was

asked for Irwin's arrest. He was released on bail of \$5,000 furnished by his father. It is said he admitted to forged.
