A lot of evidence can be brought forward to support this contention. For it is a well-known fact that the most popular girls in any circle of society are never the cleverest ones and that any baby-talk flapper can marry six times to a college graduate's once.

Go back in history as far as you like and you will find that men have never had any appetite for feminine brains unless they were scrambled. Indeed, up to a few years ago no other scandal about her could have so effectually damned a woman as for her to be called "strong-minded," and a girl who was really intelligent concealed her terrible misfortune as carefully as she would a physical blemish or a blot on her character.

Curiously enough, this fatal attraction that the moronic female has for men is not confined to men who are themselves dull and stupid and ignorant. The intellectuals succumb to it also, and so we are daily confronted with the spectacle of brilliant men married to fool women, of husbands and wives who do not speak the same language nor have a thought nor an interest in common.

Among our acquaintances we can all pick out couples in which the man is a book worm and the woman never reads even a sixth best seller; where the husband is a wit and the wife can't see a joke even after it is diagrammed for her; where the man is a learned savant and the wife murders the king's English and we are filled with a never-ceasing wonder why these men didn't pick out wives in their own intellectual class instead of electing to spend their lives with mates who were on a so much lower mental level.

One would think that such unequal marriages must inevitably end in disaster and that in time the clever man would be bound to tire of his dull wife, but such is by no means the case. In reality a man is much more apt to be happy married to a nitwit than he is to a genius.

For somehow it seems to be necessary for a man to look down upon a woman, especially to look down upon his wife, and to not only feel his superiority to her, but to have it recognized by the world. You will find no contented homes in which the gray mare is the better horse. It is because this worshipful attitude in a woman is so soothing to a man's vanity that he not only picks out the woman with a modicum of gray matter for a wife but finds her an agreeable life partner. For adulation is one of the things on which we never get fed up, and it is far more delightful to our ears to listen to hymns of praise than even the wildest wisecrack. Furthermore, no man ever finds out that his wife is lacking in intelligence so long as she considers him the greatest man in the world. On the contrary, he considers that she is a woman of most unusual judgment and perspicacity.

But here is the paradox. While men don't want women ever to display any brains, they want them to really have them. They want their wives to be clever enough to manage them without their knowing it, to keep them entertained and amused and to have enough sense to run their households thriftyly and make a good appearance in society. Only they must never let it appear that it took any intelligence to do these things.

And that is another one of the things that makes it so difficult to be a woman, because to be a successful wife a woman must be so all-fired intelligent that she can hide from her husband how smart she really is.

It improves cucumbers to peel and slice them a short time before using them, then add cracked ice or cubes and let them stand covered in the refrigerator until needed. Drain off the ice water before adding salad dressing. It is not necessary to salt them down unless you prefer them wilted. The old theory about salt "drawing out the poison" was exploded long ago.

Dice fresh pineapple very finely sugar it and set it in the refrigerator for several hours before serving. Pile the fruit lightly in tall sherbet glasses and sprinkle with a bit of minced mint. The fine dicing and the faint mint flavor greatly improves this fruit, whether to be used for appetizer or dessert.

For the family, go as far as you or they like with paprika, red pepper, celery salt, onion juice, cinnamon and nutmeg. But a good

rule for seasoning when guests are expected is "moderation in all things." Not all tastes are alike when it comes to strong flavoring.

Rubbing the hands with tomato skins will remove stubborn fruit stains from nails and fingers. Good to know at preserving time

Meat, game and fowl should not be washed more than is absolutely necessary. Immersing in water has a tendency to destroy the flavor.

When stainless steel knives can be found at even the inexpensive stores, why harbor paring knives that rust and stain with every drop of liquid? Count the cost of scouring powders, manucures and wasted time, and see if it be extravagant to discard these out-dated implements.
