Preparing For Winter Sailings

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 10—Another 6,500 mile leisurely cruise of the "Vagabond" ship Colborne, Canadian National Steamships, will terminate for this sailing with her arrival in the local port on Sunday evening, returning from a voyage via Halifax to Puerto Rico, Barbados, Trinidad, and British Guiana, on the coast of South America, of 38 days duration. Now that the regular summer holiday season is over, these ships can provide a good choice of accommodation for those wishing to embark on a quiet lengthy and comfortable voyage during the Fall season, with four days each way on the scenic St. Lawrence River and Gulf, plus a month at sea and ports of call.

The Colborne is due to sail again next Thursday evening and on this voyage southbound will make a special call at St. Georges, Bermuda and the Islands of Guadalupe and Martinique, in the French West Indies, in addition to the American colony of Puerto Rico and the British Colonies of Barbados, Trinidad and British Guiana. This itinerary will prove an interesting feature for those sailing next Thursday.

The Colborne will also bring up a good cargo of sugar molasses, citrus fruits, coconuts, cocoa beans, coffee and other tropical products for the Canadian market.
