A WELCOME VISITOR—Rev. Dr. John W. Wadman, a native of the island, and a former pastor of Grace Church of this City, will speak in First Methodist to-morrow evening at 7 o'clock. Mr. Wadman has been a Missionary of the Methodist Episcopal Church for twenty-seven years, having labored in Japan for fifteen years and twelve in Hawaiian Islands as superintendent of the Methodist Mission with work among Japanese, Koreans, Filipinos and Anglosaxons. In January last he was sent by a number of public spirited business men of Honolulu to Washington, D. C., in order to promote a bill in Congress for the prohibition of the liquor traffic on the islands and for the past seven months he has been in the city with President Wilson.

The bill is called by President Wilson, a "pernicious lobbyist" at the capitol, having succeeded in pushing his bill through some of the first stages of legislation. He returns to Washington at the next session of Congress with the hope of securing the passage of the Temperance bill. Mr. Wadman will refer in his address to his experience in the capital and also narrate some incidents of his work as a missionary in the Sandwich Islands now known as Hawaii.
