600-POUND STONE CRUSHES LIFE OUT OF HYPNOTIST'S SUBJECT.

WOONSOCKET, R. I., May 18.—During an exhibition of hypnotism given by Prof. Frank E. Farnsworth and wife, of Fitchburg, at the local opera house to-night, one of the subjects, Thomas Bolton, also of Fitchburg, was killed. Mr. Bolton was a member of Prof. Farnsworth's company and was resting between two chairs with a 600-pound stone placed on his body, when a local blacksmith, Clifford Trask, attempted to break the stone with a sledge hammer.

After Trask had given the stone two heavy blows and succeeded in cracking it

he chair on which Bolton's head rested gave way under the weight of the stone and the subject fell to the floor, the stone crushing Mr. Bolton's head almost to a jelly. He died shortly after, Dr. Barry working unsuccessfully toward helping the fatally injured man.

As soon as the accident happened, Prof. Farnsworth was placed under arrest and Trask, having left the hall and being very much affected by the sad accident, went to his boarding house, where he was also shortly after arrested. Both men will be held pending an investigation.

Guardian Correspondents Everywhere.

THE evening meeting of the District Convention of Epworth League was given up to the work in the Empire of China. China is a vast country in extent, or historically, or from any standpoint you choose to view it. Having 3000 miles of seashore and comprising almost one third of the whole population of the globe there is no gainsaying it, China is and is destined to remain a vast country. Every third child born in the world looks into the face of a Chinese mother. The death rate is 30,000 daily. The religions of China are three, Buddhism, Taoism and Confucianism. To give the gospel to these people is the mission of the Christian nations of the earth. The Methodist Church has assumed the evangelization of 10,000 of these people. The mission was organized in Oct. 1891. Their work is in Chen Tu district, in the Province of Chuan. The Methodists have had a hospital, a printing press and are anxious as soon as possible to organize a college for the propagation of their work among the Chinese. The Chinamen are described as being very thorough in what they undertake. They do nothing by halves. It takes about three months to teach them the principles of Christianity. When they do become Christians they will endure anything even to be slaughtered for Christ's sake. The Epworth League has already a Missionary department in its work which heretofore has been largely unoperative. Dr. Stephenson's visit here is to set the wheels in motion and it is hoped and expected that much instruction and inspiration will be gathered by the workers who are privileged to attend Convention and hear Dr. Stephenson. A resolution expressing appreciation of the doctor's visit and assuring him that blessing and benefit have already resulted therefrom was unanimously passed before the meeting closed.
