The Natural History and Antiquarian Society have procured one of the guns used by one of the French frigates which was blown up opposite grand battery, Louisburg harbor, in the year 1758, before it was finally surrendered. It is the intention of the society to have it placed in a conspicuous place on the square as a trophy of the final success of British arms in North America. The gun is about 7ft. 6 in long and 14 inches at the breech and is a specimen of the naval type of guns of that day. It will be brought to the province early in the spring, and when it is mounted it will be located with a ceremony as an object lesson to the children of the 20th Century.

Rev. John Reid, D. D. of St. John, formerly of the First Methodist Church, in this city writes to the Wesleyan concerning Chaplain Lane, who is to preach a missionary sermon next Sunday in this city and will give his great lecture in the church next Monday night, Feb. 4th. Rev. W. G. Lane of the N. S. Conference, kindly accepted an invitation to preach Missionary sermons in Centenary Church, and lecture upon the South African war. The discourses were most highly appreciated by the large congregations, which admired the spirit, the thought and the manner of the preacher, while the lecture ranks among the most entertaining and thrillingly impressive the citizens have enjoyed. ONE of the pleasing features of the United Memorial Service to be held in the First Methodist Church on the day of the funeral of the Queen will be the music in charge of the full band of the 4th Reg. C. A. The members of the band will occupy the front seats of the choir gallery with muffled drums and draped instruments, the choiristers sitting just behind. It is not likely that the organ will be used and Prof. Watts will assist in the band which will play "Lead Kindly Light" to the tune of Sandown. "Oh God our help in Ages Past," the tune of St. Ann's. "Peace, perfect peace," to chant. "Forever with the Lord," to tune of Nearer Home. As a voluntary the "Dead March in Saul" will be played. Special preparations will be made in the arrangement of the music and on Friday night next it is likely that a full rehearsal will be held with the choir of the church.

The administration of the oath of allegiance in the Supreme Court at 11 a. m. Saturday morning was witnessed by a large number of citizen. Rankin, H. J. Dundall, and others. A few minutes after eleven the Chief Justice, Master of the Rolls and Vice Chancellor entered clothed in their robes of office. The Judges, King's Counsel, the barristers and attorneys, and a number of public officials were aworn before His Lordship the Chief Justice.

The Committee in charge of the Decoration have made splendid progress in their work and it deserves great credit for the designing as well as the artistic draping. On entering on the north side the arch over the door is heavily draped in black cloth surmounted with a large picture of the Queen. The whole side of the post office over the boxes and general wicket is draped in black, portiers falling to the floor at regular spaces. Each draping is tied with white bows of ribbon. Over the general delivery wicket is a white wreath of waxed lilies, in the centre of which is an excellent photo of the Queen. The entrance on the north side is beautifully draped with black cashmere, in the centre of which is an excellent picture of the Queen draped with the Union Jack, over which is the motto in black with words in gold "Victoria the Good." Inside the south entrance the draping extends from the ceiling to the floor and in the centre is another large picture of the Queen draped in royal purple. The doors entering the Savings Bank and the office of the stamp vendor have been draped in an impressive manner. On the front of the building outside the six large windows on the second floor have been very heavily draped with black cloth, relieved at the top by a large black rosette with a white centre. The arranging of the drapery around the windows was a very difficult matter in view of the amount of staging necessary. The four lower windows will be finished at an early hour this morning. Before the commencement a telegram in this paper stated that \$350 was granted for the work and the result has been marvellous and we fail to see now that amount will cover the work.

VERDI THE COMPOSER DEAD.

ROME, Jan. 23.—(Special).—Verdi, the celebrated composer died at Milan today.

Giuseppe Verdi was born near Busseto in the Duchy of Parma, October 10, 1813. He attained eminence for his musical compositions, chiefly operatic, but including a requiem Mass and other sacred compositions. He was a member of the Italian Parliament for a short time and was afterwards appointed to the Senate.
