OTTAWA, Oct. 19—(CP)—Five persons, one a woman, were nominated today to contest the Ottawa East House of Commons seat vacated by Justice E.R.E. Chevrier on his elevation to the Ontario bench. Four are Liberals, one an Independent.

JAPS AIRLINE PLANS CAUSE SPECULATION

GENEVA, Oct. 19—(AP)—Japan's plan to spread a network of airlines to the far-flung Pacific Islands which formerly were German colonies created wide interest today. Speculation was stirred because the decision to operate planes to the mandated islands in the South Pacific follows inauguration of flights between San Francisco and Manila, in the Philippine Islands, by Pan American Airways. The plan, announced in Japan's annual report to the League of Nations, was studied closely also because of the enormous area the islands cover. The mandated territory, comprising the Marianne, Caroline and Marshall groups, include 1400 islands, islets and reefs. They stretch out about 1300 miles from north to south and about 2700 miles from east to west. The Japanese asserted the undertaking was "to promote efficiency of administration and assist industrial and social activities of the inhabitants."

Manchoukuo Plans To "Liquefy Coal"

MUKDEN, Manchoukuo, Oct. 19—(AP)—Manchoukuo, long on coal but short on oil, is to have two "liquefaction of coal" plants in operation next year. The South Manchuria Railway, spearhead of Japanese advances on the Asiatic mainland, has begun the erection of a plant in Fushun, adjacent to the world famous open-pit mines. The railroad, owned in part by the Japanese Government, launched its project after long experimentation. A field of 20,000 tons of oil a year is expected at the start with the output vastly increased when the eventual investment of 34,000,000 yen becomes fully productive.

Seek New Outlet For Scrip Money

EDMONTON, Oct. 19—(CP)—The Aberhart Government is seeking a new outlet for scrip money, suggesting to cabinet ministers and civil servants they take a percentage of their salaries in prosperity certificates. A circular from the treasury department has been mailed to departmental heads, asking them to canvass their employees on the plan. In addition, Works Minister Fallow said a check is being made among cabinet ministers to see how many will volunteer to take a part of their salaries in scrip. "The matter is being left entirely optional with each minister," Mr. Fallow said.

BEGIN PROBE INTO LAKE SHIP TRAGEDY

Investigate Tragic Foundering of "Sand Merchant" with Loss Of 19 Lives.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) CLEVELAND, Oct. 19—(A.P.)—Canadian officials and representatives of the National Sand and Materials Limited began today a preliminary investigation of the tragic foundering on Lake Erie of the Toronto-owned sandstraker, Sand Merchant, with the loss of 19 lives. The Sand Merchant rolled over in a gale west of Cleveland Saturday night and sank. At dawn Sunday only seven members of the all-Canadian crew, including Capt. Graham MacLellan, of Cape Tormentine, N.B., remained clinging to the two upturned lifeboats from which they were rescued by other ships. Eighteen members of the crew and Mrs. Bernard Drinkwater, wife of the first mate, were lost. First Mate Drinkwater was among the dead. The Canadian Deputy Minister of Marine, R. K. Smith, said at Ottawa that he had asked Capt. Henry W. King of Toronto, examiner of masters and mates, to make a preliminary inquiry into the shipwreck. Mr. Smith said the inquiry would be held at a point convenient for the summoning of the seven survivors as witnesses. Attorney Lee C. Hinsley, representing National Sand and Materials Limited, conducted a preliminary investigation today and said "we came to the conclusion that the sank due to heavy seas and shifting of the sand cargo to the port side." The Sand Merchant was loaded with about 3,000 tons of sand picked up at Point Pelee and consigned to Cleveland. Waves were running as high as 12 feet at the time of the foundering, survivors said. Hinsley said water poured into the ship's hold faster than six large electric pumps could force it out. The Sand Merchant was inspected last June and found to be seaworthy.

Farmer Slain Through Window

BYEMOOR, Alta., Oct. 19—(CP)—Third "window" murder in Alberta in the last three years was being investigated today by Royal Canadian Mounted Police. George Pogmore, farmer and truckman, was killed last night while he played cards with three male companions by a shot fired through a window. The other two murders also occurred in the fall of the year, one in 1934, the other last year. Both were solved. Pogmore, not known to have any enemies, was killed almost instantly by a bullet, believed from a high-powered rifle.

As Great Madrid Battle Impends



In the steady advance of rebel forces toward Madrid, the fierce Moroccan troops played a major role, a truckload of them being shown above, on their way to the front. The map at the right shows the loyalists' last powerful line of defense. It forms, roughly, a half circle, starting north of the capital and extending to Ilescas, on the south, as indicated by heavy line. Crosslines show strategic railroads and broken line is the boundary between Madrid and Toledo provinces. Along this front, General Masquet constructed broad belts of barbed wire, cement machine gun pillboxes, and strong trench positions.

Hundreds Homeless After Earthquake

GENEVA DI SACILE, Italy, Oct. 19—(AP)—Hundreds were homeless tonight after week-end earthquakes caused an estimated damage of 20,000,000 lire (\$1,000,000). An official communique put the death total at 18 at least. A cold, driving rain added to the misery of the homeless, many of whom pitched tents in the fields. Premier Mussolini decreed a special rescue fund, the amount to be announced later, and sent officials of the public works department to the scene to start reconstruction work.

Meteor Bursts In Newfoundland

HARBOR GRACE, Nfld., Oct. 19—(AP)—Residents reported a meteor burst over Avalon Peninsula today. Advice came from widely separated communities from Fortune Bay to Conception Bay reporting "balls of fire falling." Residents of Harbor Grace said, "a ball of fire appeared to fall a short distance from the airport."

THREE OTHER OCCUPANTS OF HOUSE ESCAPE

Residence of Alban LeBlanc Razed By Flames Last Night.

Lorraine, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alban LeBlanc of Summerside perished in a fire which destroyed the LeBlanc home last night. Awakened by the sound of the fire that was sweeping up the stairs from the ground floor Mr. LeBlanc and his wife made heroic efforts to rescue their two children. Four-year-old May was carried out of the room where she was sleeping and lowered from the second story window by her father. When Mr. LeBlanc returned for the baby smoke and searing flame drove him back. Mrs. LeBlanc jumped from the window to summon assistance. When the firemen arrived streams of water were directed into the room where the year-old Lorraine lay and Constable Drummond-Hay of the Mounted Police when the flames had been subdued somewhat, ventured into the room and returned with the charred body. The opinion was expressed late last night that a lamp that the family had turned down when they retired had exploded causing the conflagration. Latest reports from the hospital where Mrs. LeBlanc was taken said that she was resting as comfortably as could be expected and that May was rather badly burned about the face, hands, neck and feet. Mr. LeBlanc was burned and bruised considerably but was not taken to the hospital. The LeBlanc house was located on North Market Street. The fire broke out about 10.30 p.m.

Premier King Attends Canada Club Dinner

LONDON, Oct. 19—(CP Cable)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King tonight attended a dinner at the Canada Club in honor of Sir Percy Vincent, Lord Mayor of London. Sir Campbell Stuart, a native of Montreal, presided. After repeated calls for a speech, Mr. King expressed the privilege of joining in the tribute to the Lord Mayor, who recently returned from a visit to Canada. A message of greeting from the Duke of Connaught, former Governor-General of Canada, was read. Sir Campbell Stuart said the Duke was now in his 87th year, but his Canadian memories never grew dim. The toast to the Lord Mayor was supported by Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner to the United Kingdom. Other speakers included G. G. McGeer of Vancouver and Leslie Hore-Belisha, Minister of Transport.

Hindu - Moslem Riots Continue

BOMBAY, Oct. 19—(AP)—Four persons were killed and 30 injured in renewed religious rioting today, bringing the death toll to 58. Four other persons died of injuries received Sunday. Troops patrolled the streets as fears of an epidemic were expressed because of garbage collectors' refusal to work. The riots were started Thursday when a construction of a Hindu place of worship was started near a Moslem mosque.

Motorized Rebel Column Within 16 Miles Of Capital

Administration May Be Moved To Mediterranean Coast City, Report.

By The Associated Press President Manuel Azana and three of his cabinet ministers reached Barcelona on Spain's Mediterranean coast last night from Madrid, as Insurgents pressing on the city from the south drove a Government column back to a point only 16 miles from the capital. There were reports Azana, a leading figure in Republican Spain since the monarchy ended in 1931, would move his administration to Barcelona from Madrid. An official statement at Barcelona, however, declared he had merely made that city his first stop in a "series of tours" to strengthen the morale of troops in the sections of Spain still supporting the Madrid regime.

Potato Futures Hit New Highs

CHICAGO, Oct. 19—(AP)—Potato futures established new peaks for the year, with March delivery contracts at an all time high price, in an active session in which gains ranged from 10 to 20 cents a hundredweight today. March potatoes soared 20 points to \$3.10, October closed at \$2.33 and January at \$2.90 a hundred. The skyrocketing of the futures was attributed by traders to several factors including predictions of freezing temperatures tonight in northwest areas, moderate receipts and a good demand for western stock here.

LINER GROUNDS

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 20—(Tuesday)—(CP)—The Cunard-White Star liner Lancastria, with 600 passengers aboard, grounded today during a gale in the River Mersey. The vessel, of 16,243 gross tons, was returning from a Mediterranean cruise.
