

# Alouettes Come From Behind To Score 22-7 Victory Over Ottawa

MONTREAL, Nov. 9 — (CP)—Montreal Alouettes struck hard and often against the powerful Ottawa Rough Riders today and came out of the first of the two-game playoff in the Big Four Football Union with a sensational 22-7 victory.

The 15-point lead that will be carried into the second game at Ottawa Saturday came as something of a surprise to a chilled crowd of 15,272.

The Alouettes, driving hard and making few mistakes, did it the hard way. They spotted Ottawa to a converted touchdown in the opening quarter and then came back in such convincing fashion that Riders took their first real treading of the year.

In the regular season the Riders lost only one game—to Alouettes by a single point. On today's play Montreal will easily rule favorite to take the series and the right to continue on toward the East-West Grey Cup final.

Howie Turner playing his usual standout game for Riders eliminated an Ottawa drive in the first quarter with a 30-yard touchdown heave to Bob Paffrath. It was converted by Eric Chipper.

Frankie Filchock fired touchdown passes to Ralph Tooby and Tommy Manasterky for the Als and Glen Douglas and Bob Cunningham rounded out the Montreal majors.

Turner booted a single for Riders in the second quarter and Ches McCance converted two of the Als' touches. Another attempt was blocked and a second was wasted because of an offside.

Alouettes victory was achieved without the help of Vic Wagner. The razzle-dazzle halfback and leading point scorer of the league was at home with an infected nose and swollen face, the result of a nose injury in last Saturday's game against Toronto Argonauts. He was reported running a high temperature and it was not believed he will be able to play Saturday.

The curling season locally will get underway the first week in December officials have announced. It is hoped to have the paid-up membership complete by that time and the Games Committee, under George Hawkins, finalize their program of events.

While the Dominion Championship play at Vancouver is not until next Spring a number of curlers here are already planning to attend. It is proposed to charter a 23-passenger plane from M.C.A. and make it available to curlers from Maritime clubs interested in making the trip to the Pacific coast.

Mr. J. Finlay MacLeod who is sounding out the membership of other Maritime clubs has already four of the seats spoken for. No great difficulty is expected in filling the quota. The special plane would probably leave here on a Friday and arrive in Vancouver Sunday. Remaining in Vancouver a week the curlers could be back here within two weeks. However the visit could be extended at the request of those chartering the flight.

It has been reported from reliable sources, that this year's Maritime intercollegiate competition will be operated on a much larger scale than in previous years. SAINT JOHN, N.B., Nov. 9 — (CP)—Amherst Ramblers resumed their losing ways in the Maritime Senior Hockey League by bowing 6-3 tonight to Saint John Beavers, who strengthened their second place position to only one game behind the leading Halifax St. Mary's.

It was the 14th loss for Ramblers out of 15 starts. Their single win to date was a 5-4 edging of Moncton Hawks last Monday.

The three Amherst goals were shot in little more than a two-minute span soon after the first period opened. For a time it looked as if the visitors headed for a second win but they were unable to maintain the scoring pace.

After a brace in the first and trailing 3-2 in the second, Beavers tied the count well before the middle session ended, adding a trio in the last can.

Beavers had things pretty much their own way in gaining a first period 2-0 lead on ganging attacks. The goals came 14 seconds apart, late in the session, and resulted from team work by the line of Mouse Dowling, Vic Jackson and Dick Wray. Dowling counted first, hitting the left corner of the net with a shot from the side. Jackson was the second scorer.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 — (CP)—Edgar Laprade's goal early in the third period enabled New York Rangers to come from behind and tie the Montreal Canadiens 2-2 tonight before 11,417 fans, the smallest crowd to watch a National Hockey League contest at Madison Square Garden this season.

Both Montreal goals were scored by Maurice (The Rocket) Richard in the first period, each time with a Ranger in the penalty box. They were Richard's eighth and ninth of the season and gave the N.H.L.'s only active 200-goal man a lifetime total of 216 in league competition.

Richard's first marker came at 1:16, a bare 13 seconds after Dunc Fisher of the Rangers, the league's No. 1 had man, was sent off for tripping. Richard took a pass from Terry Reardon and fired a sizzler from about 20 feet out. Gus Klyo, Montreal defenceman, evened the count a little more than six minutes later by driving in a partially-screened shot from a scramble. Laprade drew an assist on the play.

With Klyo serving a minor penalty in the frame, the Rocket made it 2-1 for Montreal at 18:59 by driving the puck under goalie Chuck Rayner a split second before he fell on his back.

The deadlock lasted through a second period during which the Canadiens drew two of their three minor penalties.

Laprade notched his game-tying goal at 5:16 of the final period on a neat bit of stick-handling during a melee in front of the Montreal net. The Ranger centre skated past the Canadiens' defencemen, Glen Harmon and Doug Harvey, who had been knocked to the ice, and drove an angle shot past Bill Durnan, the league's leading goalkeeper.

The game marked the debut this season in a Ranger uniform for Jean-Paul Denis, the Montreal-born right-winger who was recalled Tuesday from New Haven in the American Hockey League to bolster the sagging Rangers.

Tonight's contest was the 200th consecutive N.H.L. game for defenceman Pat Egan of the Rangers — longest "iron man" string for any active player in the league with the exception of goalies.

BOSTON, Nov. 9 — (CP)—Hard-driving Roy Conacher paced Chicago Black Hawks to a 3-1 National Hockey League victory over Boston Bruins tonight before a skimpy 10,074 crowd at Boston Garden. Conacher broke a 1-1 tie in the second period and more than settled matters early in the finale by setting up a goal for Doug Bentley.

The Bruins, now winners of four of their last five starts, dominated the action most of the way, despite the fact that their goalie, Frankie Brimsek, recent Boston idol, had 27 saves against 18 for rookie Jack Gelineau in the Bruins' net.

Gelineau had but one save during the opening period but it came long after Gus Stewart put the Hawks out front by hooking a loose puck in the centre zone, slipping around three rivals and then scoring a sizzling 15-footer.

The Bruins, playing short-handed, pulled into a 1-1 tie late during the 19th minute of play, when rookie Phil Maloney stick-handled down the middle and beat Brimsek from close range.

Conacher scored the clincher during the ninth minute of the middle session by polishing off a combination play with Bentley and

Bill Mosenko. And to make matters certain early in the finale, Conacher went into the right corner of the Boston zone and centre for Bentley, who blasted through Gelineau from about six feet.

Big Milt Schmidt, now playing a defensive role for the Bruins, and Doug McCaig engaged in a punching-grappling bout during the third session and, after being prised apart by the three officials, were sent off to serve major penalties.

The Bruins, back from a disastrous two-week road trip, now have gone seven straight games without a victory. During that stretch their best efforts produced a 3-3 tie with the Canadiens in Montreal.
