

# Abbies Trounce Vics 10-4 In Juvenile Hockey Game

Paul Williams' Juvenile Abbies proved too strong for the Victorias at the Forum last night to trounce them by a 10-4 count and clinch the opening game of the Island Physical Fitness Juvenile Hockey League and go to the front of the league standing.

Outplaying them badly for two periods to outshoot them 5-0 in the first and 3-1 in the second for an 8-1 advantage, the Abbies were set back on their heels a bit in the final session when the Vics took advantage of two Abbie penalties, a major to Coyle and a minor to Burgess, to slap in three quick goals in a little more than a minute of play, the first one coming at 11:45. The Abbies picked up two in the earlier part of the frame.

It was about the Vics only determined bid of the game, however, and the Abbies kept them pretty well bottled up behind their own blue line for the major part of the contest.

The smooth-working line of Hennessy, Carver and Flannigan were the big guns for the Abbies and accounted for seven of their team's ten tallies. Hennessy snared four, Carver two and Flannigan one. Kennedy, Burgess and Dalziel accounted for the other three by sniping one each.

Turner was the top gun for the Vics to chalk up two of his team's goals and assisted on another, while Cheverie and Kelly ranked

up the other two, garnering one each.

There were three major penalties handed out during the night by referees Ivan Frizzell and Bob Rogers. Gillis and Hughes were the first when they were waved off for fighting in the opening of the second period, that caused quite a bit of excitement for a few minutes. Coyle got the other for drawing blood with high sticking in the third.

## Keen Interest In Abegweit, Victorias Clash Tonight

It is anticipated that the largest crowd of the season will be making their way to the Forum tonight at 8:30 where the Abegweit and Victorias will clash in their first meeting in Island Intermediate Hockey League competition this season.

Fresh from their sixth straight victory on Tuesday night when they edged out Saint Dunstan's University by a narrow 2-1 margin in the smartest game of the season to date, the Kane coached Abegweit pucks will be gunning around the net, but it is expected to be a tight contest. The Vics, who will be minus the assistance of defenceman Ralph Josey, Josey fractured a bone in his wrist in Tuesday night's game against S.D.U., and was the sniper of their winning goal that gave the Abbies their 2-1 victory. It will be the first meeting between these two squads this season and there is considerable difference of opinion as to who is going to win tonight's tussle. Although the Abbies have the best record to date, in fact a perfect one, six wins in six starts, to go unbeaten in league play so far this year, the Vics on the other hand have no mean accomplishment to their credit either, with three victories in five starts. But what will happen when the two teams cross sticks with one another is hard to say.

There is one thing certain, however, and that is that both teams will be coming out to do their level best to score tonight, and with the keenest of rivalry existing between the two clubs, there should be plenty of fast, rugged action.

If the Abbies can pull the hat trick again it will be their third straight victory of the season and will give them such a commanding lead at the head of the league standing that will leave little chance for them to be overtaken in the regular schedule. A win for the Vics, however, can get them within easy reach of the league leadership, just four points down on Abbies, and will also consolidate their second place position.

Hockey and curling activities are really starting to roll at present all over the Province. From East to West now that the real winter weather has set in and looks like it intends to stay for a while. Nearly every day now one or another of the rural leagues are launching into action and many more will be getting underway within the next few days.

A regular progressive movement in the country areas seems to prevail everywhere, with new rinks springing up in a number of the communities. It is expected to be a gala affair, and the program will include an exhibition of figure skating by Mr. W. E. Scantlebury and partner between periods, and a skate after with the music being supplied by the Charlottetown 17th Recce Regiment Band.

Both curling and hockey has been launched for the season at the Montague rink too, with the opening matches in the President-Vice President competition being held there last week and the hockey launched earlier this week when the Juvenile Abbies and the Montague Meteors clashed in an exhibition game.
