AMONG THE HORSES

Gazeta 2.06, by Admiral Dewey 2.04, has been sent to the court of Peter Volo 2.02.

Bert Shanks expects to get Anna Bradford 2.00, to the races later on in the season.

Of the 2.04 races on the Grand Circuit last season only 36 required more than four heats.

Mary Heir 2.25, by Minor Heir 1.53, is now owned by Dan Groves of St. Stephen, N. B.

The number of trotters and pacers to take new records last season was 2080, of which 1078 were trotters.

The fast but unfortunate Gay Andolin 2.06, is to be given another chance over the mile rings this season.

It is thought that Babe, 2.04, after resting two years, will be ready for another campaign when the season opens.

Lady Achille, by Achille 2.15, owned by J. H. Oliver of Thornburn, N. B., recently presented her owner with a handsome chestnut colt by Combus Todd Jr.

Although Captain Shaw has seven yearlings by his great trotter Peter Mac, 2.03, it is said he will probably keep them over until they are three years old before racing them.

Over 60,000 heavy horses have been taken out of Canada since the war began to be declared. A nominal standard is to be maintained after the war is over it is up to the breeders to get busy.

There are 161 entries for the seven day driving stakes of 500 each at Northampton. There are a number of entries from Canada, and some Maine horses well known on the Canadian turf.

Raoul Potvin the Canadian trainer, has moved to the half-mile track at Malone, N. Y. In his string are Auburn 2.16, Maida, 2.14, and Lena Peters a green daughter of Peter the Great 2.07.

It is said that Captain Fred Peters, of Summerside, owner of the mare Pattie Bangs, which he bred last season to Baron Highball, has a written offer of \$175 for the colt when it arrives.

The Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association has withdrawn from the National Trotting Association and has announced that the fall trials will be conducted under the rules of the American Trotting Association.

The southern trotting gelding Bronco 2.18, was one of the most active campaigners out in 1915, as he took part in 24 races, and was either first or second in 19. In his last five weeks trip he was either first or second in 13 starts.

Amos Whitley Jr., paid \$2,000 for Senator O'Brien, a two year old colt at the Indianapolis disposal sale the other day. Senator O'Brien is a son

Worked the Great and last June he won a half in 1.10 on the Lexington track. Nothing more was done with him until the fall with very little preparation he was given a record of 2.29. He is eligible to practically all the rich events for youngsters.

Iron Mask one of the most famous sprinters of all times on the American turf, died at Lexington, Ky., the other day of double pneumonia. He was eight years old and was by Disguise Royal Rose. He was bred at Castleton and was owned by the late James R. Keene. Iron Mask had the distinction of having raced successfully in England, United States, Canada, Mexico and Cuba. His winnings on this side of the water total \$22,007. In 1913 he set the world record for six furlongs of 1.10 4-5 and reduced that mark to 1.09 3-5 at Juarez the following winter. At Juarez he also set a new American record for five and one-half furlongs at 1.03 3-5. He was well insured.

"Tommy" Hayes, the St. John horseman, has just purchased in New York the high-class stallion Silver Peter, four years old by Peter the Great 2.07 1-3. Silver Peter is a very fast natural trotter. In 1915 he is coal black, a great show horse, having already won three blue ribbons at fairs, including the Syracuse State Fair, 1915. He weighs upwards of 1100 pounds, with the very best of feet and legs. His sire, Peter the Great, 2.07 1-3, is probably the most wonderful speed sire the world has ever seen. At twenty years of age he was recently sold for \$50,000.

Official

(Special to the Guardian.) ROME, May 22 (via London 25)—An official communication issued today reads from Stella Grada there was artillery and the fire of the greatest intensity in the zone Odvirale and Tomale. In Lagarine Valley after an intense night bombardment of our position at Com. Engna, the enemy made two attacks in the direction of Zarrs Valla and Col. Li Puole which were vigorously repulsed. On the following morning the attack was renewed with fresh troops on Col. Puole but again repulsed with heavy enemy losses. This repulse was followed by our troops who recaptured the height of Darnehian. Southeast of Col. Di Buole during the day there were several artillery duels. We made a full hit of the enemy with a Gun of medium calibre which in being transported toward Pozzachio. Between Val Arsa, and Pesina the enemy after having kept our position at Pasubio under a violent bombardment launched a night attack with strong columns of infantry. These were mowed down

WHAT CANADA PAYS!

SOLDIERS PAY AND ALLOWANCES, CONDITIONS OF ENLISTMENT PROVISION FOR WIVES, MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

Canada is determined that her sons shall be as well paid and their families as well cared for, as a grateful and wealthy country can afford. The scale of pay for Overseas Service, the allowances from the Patriotic Fund, and the Pensions are more liberal, on a basis than those of any other country engaged in the war.

The men are, of course, fed and clothed by the Government. The Separation Allowance is the sum paid by the Government to the wife of each enlisted man, or to the widowed mother if the son is unmarried and is her sole support. This is in addition to part of his pay which is reserved for her.

One-half of a soldier's pay is withheld by the Government and paid to his dependents. This ensures that at least \$35.00 per month is paid by the Government to the wife of each soldier.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND

The Patriotic Fund has been created to assist those dependents of a soldier who need more help than the Government gives. From this Fund the following sums are paid if the need exists—

Wives	From \$5.00 to \$10.00 per month
Children of widowers	
Mothers of unmarried men	
Children of married men according to age and number in family	\$1.50 to \$6.00 each per month

Ladies representing the Patriotic Fund pay regular visits to families of men on Overseas Service, and give friendly advice and practical help in case of need. Many employers have pledged themselves to give preference to returned soldiers when engaging men.

PENSIONS

The Canadian scale of pensions range for private soldier, from \$75.00 per year for certain minor injuries to \$264.00 for total disability. In case of death \$22.00 a month is paid to the widow, and \$5.00 a month for each child. A widowed mother whose son was her whole support receives \$22.00 a month.
