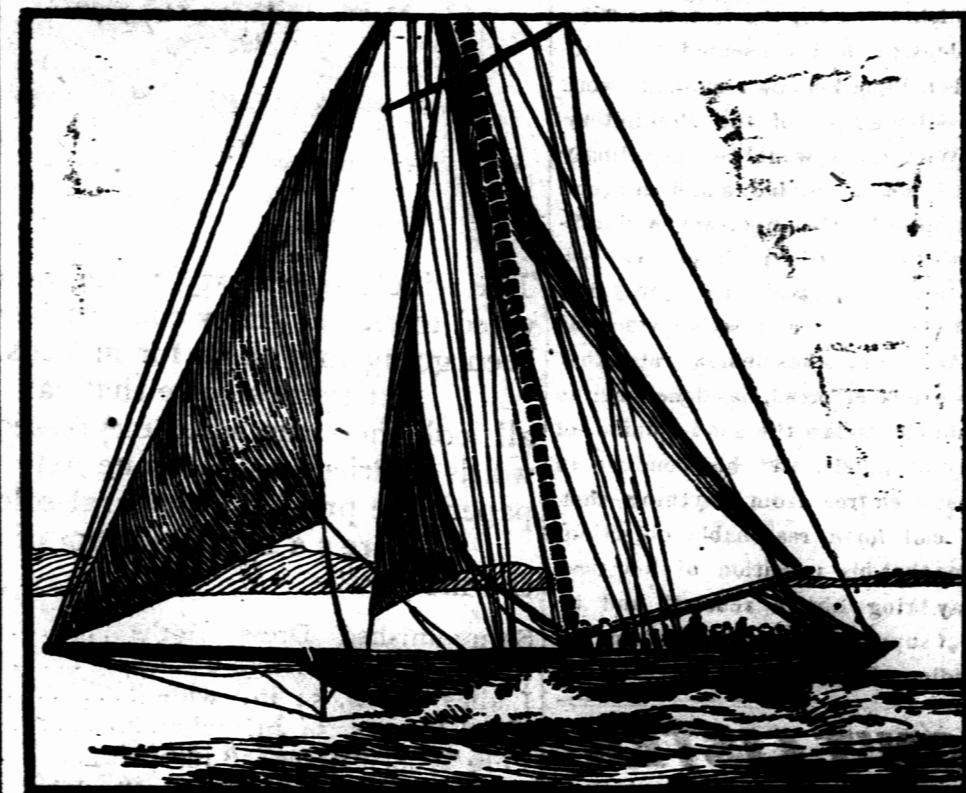
GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC PASSES TO COM'TEE

W. J. King, who has been sometime in Sydney, leaves by this morning's train for his home in Tracadie, P. E. I.—Sydney Post.

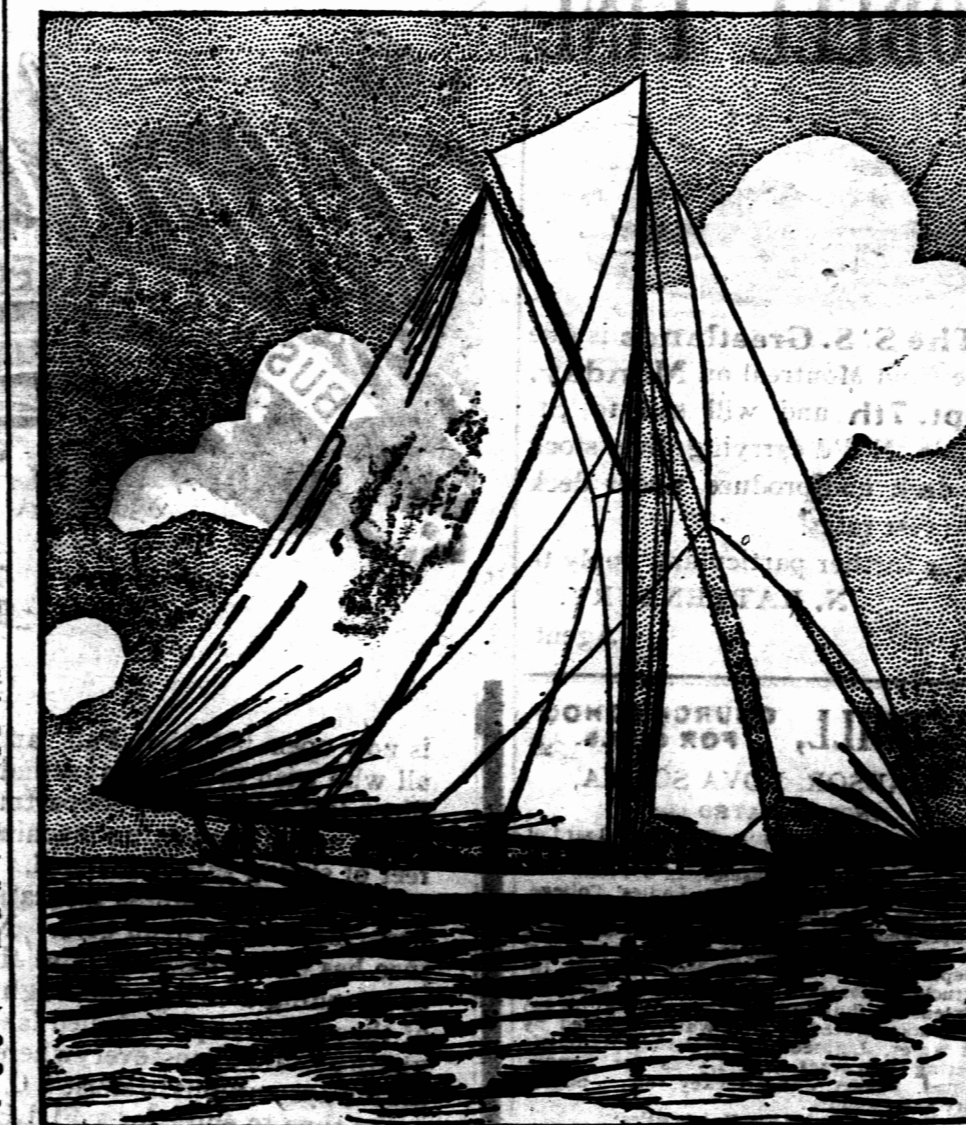

Amendments Voted Down—Four Members Who Usually Voted with Government Dissent—Location to be Made by Engineers—Banquet to R. L. Borden.

VOTE ON THE G. T. PACIFIC.

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.—(Special)—The vote was taken on the amendments and main motion of the Grand Trunk Pacific Bill at 3:30 o'clock this morning.

It was mainly a party vote, the Liberals or Independents who voted against the bill being as below.

VOTE ON PUTTEE'S AMENDMENT.

The first amendment was voted on at two o'clock. This was Mr. Boyd's amendment to Mr. Puttee's amendment calling for Government ownership and operation of the railway.

THE GOVERNMENT'S BIG MAJORITY.

This was defeated by 68 for and 119 against; a Government majority of 51. Puttee's amendment was also lost.

HOW THE DISSIDENTS VOTED.

Messrs. Blair, Tarte, Puttee and Jabel Robinson voted against the main motion in the House.

Mr. Blair voted with Casgrain against Puttee's proposals.

Mr. Tarte voted against Mr. Casgrain's amendment.

SETTLED IN SHORT ORDER.

What ordinarily would take three days to accomplish was disposed of in brief order. As soon as the House met Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved to go into Committee on the Grand Trunk Pacific resolution which was adopted.

OPPOSITION AGREE TO GO ON.

Last night Mr. Monk, who is leading the

Opposition in Mr. Borden's absence, agreed to permit this resolution to go through all its stages and go on with the bill in Committee.

THE REMAINING STAGES.

All that is required now to be done in the House is to put the bill through Committee and give it its third reading. It will then go to the Senate.

LOCATION MADE BY ENGINEERS.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the exact location of the line would be left to the locating engineers. That was the usual custom and was done in connection with the Canadian Pacific, and the Governor in Council would approve.

MCLAN ASKS A QUESTION.

Mr. McLean wanted to know if Senator Cox was to be connected with the flotation of the securities.

SENATOR COX NOT IN IT.

Hon. Mr. Fielding said the Government would raise the money in the usual way on the money markets of the world or through the Canadian banks and Senator Cox had nothing to do with the Government in the matter.

QUEBEC, Sept. 2.—(Special)—An enthusiastic meeting of Conservatives decided to arrange a complimentary banquet to Mr. Borden at the end of the present month.
