POLICE COURT.—At the Charlottetown Police Court Saturday morning the cases against Ronald J. Steele and Allan MacDonald for infractions of the Prohibition Act were each adjourned until May 23. Angus Cameron for disorderly driving was fined \$3 or 10 days, and Henry Doan for depositing filth and rubbish on a vacant lot was dismissed with a warning. The case of Louis Burnett and John Horne for assault and battery on the 13th was dismissed.

It is now generally realized that the first step, and a long one, has been taken in the development of the tourist business of this province through the enterprise and foresight of the young men associated under the name of the Summer Resort Limited.

Why the step had not been taken years ago; why one of the most picturesque tracts of land in the province, if not on the American continent, within fifteen minutes of Charlottetown and commanding a view of the city, the harbor, the rivers and the surrounding country should be undeveloped and almost neglected can only be attributed to that peculiar apathy which, until very recently, possessed the people of the province.

A representative of The Guardian had the pleasure, the other day, of driving, in company with Mr. R. I. Cotton, Managing Director of the Summer Resorts Limited, over the property recently acquired by the company, noting the development that has already taken place and speculating upon the infinite possibilities for future development.

The property consists of 650 acres of land skirting the harbor front from Rocky Point Wharf for a distance of about two miles, towards the mouth of the harbor. The land is gently undulating, some of the hills rising to a height sufficient to command a magnificent view of the four rivers converging in Hillsborough Bay; West and Clyde Rivers, North and East Rivers and the surrounding country for a distance of 20 to 30 miles. There are several magnificent groves of mixed hardwood and softwood timber scattered over the property and these are now being cleaned up and made suitable for walks, drives, camping and picnic grounds, etc. Some of the roads have the distinction of having been built by the French settlers in the early days of 1700, while such historic spots as Fort la Jolie, Block House Fort and other evidences of the early French settlement of the colony form conspicuous and interesting subjects of study and contemplation.

It is proposed to build, for occupancy about the first of July, a dozen bungalow cottages with accommodation for from three to seven persons each. These will be furnished by the company and rented at from \$60 to \$100 for the season. These furnished bungalows are intended mainly for out of the province visitors and are nearly all already spoken. There will also be a number of bungalows unfurnished, which will be rented at lower rates to local people. Besides this, sites have already been leased to local people who will build their own cottages and it is expected there will be quite a number of these. Arrangements are also being made to provide a number of canvas tents, nicely floored, to be let by the day or week to those wishing to spend a short time in the Resorts. These of course will be provided only on application and already quite a number have been applied for.

A dining hall is being built with prospective seating accommodation for 50 to 100 guests daily and ten suites of rooms are being provided for the accommodation of transient visitors.

From this it will be seen that the Resorts, even this summer will be able to accommodate a large number of visitors, temporarily at least, while an early application will ensure excellent accommodation for the whole season.

The company will install an electric light plant sufficient to light up the whole colony; there is an excellent water supply and a thorough system of sanitation is being arranged for. For the delectation of sightseers a tower will be built on one of the highest elevations on the property from which splendid views will be obtained of the whole surrounding country, the harbor, the rivers, the straits and the Nova Scotia hills in the distance.
