PEARSON—At Chelton on November 11th, 1917, Edward R. Pearson aged 85 years and 8 months.

CARSON CRITICIZES LORD NORTHCLIFFE

LONDON, Nov. 26.—Sir Edward Carson, in a speech in London today, defending the military and naval leaders from recent attacks and characterizing the agitation as a "sham crisis," attacked Lord Northcliffe. He said:

"In the midst of these attacks a great man—a superman, if you like—comes to tell us that, in contrast with America, we are so inefficient that America will have to take over the management of the war. I have a great admiration for this great man but I think that it is a great calamity upon his fellow-citizens, and I know it is not the view of Americans.

"I have had the honor of meeting many members of the American mission, and they are lost in astonishment and amazement at the organization and the effort put forward by Great Britain. I have searched the official reports, and this great man, so far as I can see, has never made one single suggestion since the war began from his seat in Parliament, where he can be criticized. I attended a meeting in Downing street today. America has shaken hands with England across the Atlantic. We are in the war together to the end, and they will see it through."

The recipe for Potato Chowder mentioned above, is as follows:—

Potato Chowder—
6 potatoes
1 onion
1 tablespoon flour
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1 teaspoon salt
slice salt pork
1 tablespoon dripping
1 pint milk
½ teaspoon pepper.

Cut potatoes into dice and pork into small pieces. Fry the pork and onion in a pan until light brown. Put potatoes, onions, meat into a pot, add a pint of water with seasonings. Simmer half an hour. Make a white sauce of the milk, flour and dripping, add to the cooked potatoes, etc. Let all boil a few minutes and serve hot.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not at a Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land, in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acre extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

October 17, 1917.

You might think I have lots of time but I have not, that's why I always ask you how they are because I can't write you see, but I will do my best to write to them Dear.

Yes Louise dear I would like to see Margaret in her bath. It must be fun to watch her. I would also like to see Freddie Macdonald, I guess he is growing pretty big! I suppose I told you about my showing Lem Rush and Bill Byers the pictures. They said they were fine and I was proud of that too believe me. Well Louise I suppose there will be lots of boys picked up down there now since they are leaving them to come.

I guess I will be soon going on pass now and when I go I will get some pictures taken to send to you and Mrs. and Mr. Stanley. I would like to get some taken when I come out of the trenches. You would not know me covered with mud, not shaved or anything but you cannot mind that. The boys when coming out sing all the old Canadian songs and are merry and feeling in good health as I am at present.

Well I will close as I have no news at present, Sam Donovan was lucky to get back wasn't he? This is all for now so I guess I will close hoping to hear from you soon, with love from your loving Husband.

CRUSH THE MAD DOG OF EUROPE AND END WAR SAYS SENATOR HALE

BOSTON, Nov. 26.—The only hope of the Allies in the war is to "crush the mad dog of Europe" declared Frederick Hale, United States Senator from Maine in an address to the Merchants' Club tonight.

"For a German victory, and any thing but a real beating for the Central Powers will be a German victory, means this—it means that no matter what terms Germany offers in the settlement of the war she will be from now on the dominating controlling power in the world. She will have proved to the world the advantages of her autocratic form of Government because through it she was able to withstand and practically to whip the whole world in arms."

Oct. 25th.

Dear Mother and Father:—Received your ever welcome letter a few days ago and glad to know you are all well as this leaves me at present. Well today it is raining all day so we are having a great old day's rest which is a very welcome thing to us but in a few days time we will be in the midst of the battle again, the things are so interesting that we don't think of rest or any little thing like that, our whole glory is to kill out the Huns we can see or get our hands on.

Well I see by the papers where they have started to conscript the men in Canada. Well it is men we want and more men all the time for old Fritz is a hard old chap to handle, but we are doing it every day. Of course the fight is a hard one, especially this time of the year from now until the spring. The cold and the mud is half the battle, but the only way is to keep looking ahead for a great victory "some day" and then we will forget all our troubles and hardships which we went through.

Well I will find it hard to read this letter, for my table is not very good. I am lying down on some straw in an old barn which is our home these days, and I am using my gas mask for a table, so you see many accommodations are not the best but such is a soldier's life in France. Well I saw Charlie Campbell the other day. He is fine and dandy. They are not with us but quite near.

I received your box O. K., and I tell you what mamma those dear old white socks were the welcome thing I put a pair on as soon as I got them. There is nothing like the dear old home made socks, and the tobacco was another very welcome thing. Thanks one and all for the goodies which are so welcome to us.

I suppose you are busy at the potatoes now. I hope they are a good crop for you will want a good lot to fill me up when I go home, for it is very seldom we ever get one over here, but I will make up for it when I get home again.

How did the grain turn out? I hope it was a good crop. There are some great stocks of grain in this country. This is a great farming country. I guess after the war I will buy a farm and marry a French lady. We have great fun talking French to them, I will soon be able to talk to them. They don't understand or talk English, at all. Well now I guess I will close for tonight. Don't worry about me at home I am well and happy. Bye bye for this time from your loving son.

VISCOUNT NORTHCLIFFE GIVES STATEMENT

(Canadian Press Despatch)

LONDON, November 25.—Viscount Northcliffe, who was head of the British Mission to the United States for the coordination of war work, tonight gave the Associated Press, the following statement on the war situation:

"This has been distinctly the best week of the war. I refer not only to General Byng's success, but to that of Colonel House and Premier Lloyd George, who have been buttoning things up, to use an expression of the Colonel's. The days of the waste of life and treasure caused by the Allies' mutual ignorance of one another's plans are nearly over. American soldiers, sailors and business men and their British colleagues have been working overtime.

"It would not be wise to talk of details, but as I never have been backward in criticizing in efficiency, I should be lacking in justice if I did not speak of the high efficiency of this week's conference. There was no 'glorious British constitution and Fourth of July' hot air about the proceedings. It was realized that time is the most valuable asset of war. There was very little banqueting and there were no parties, yet I venture to say that the greatest move toward victory yet made in any theatre of the war was effected in London.

"The prospects of the Paris conference are fine. The war is at last becoming what it always should have been—a close business partnership of the Allies."
