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AMERICAN FRIENDSHIP TO GREAT BRITAIN

Notable Meeting of American Legion When General Pershing in Presence of Thousands Denounced Foreign Abuse of U. S. Citizenship.

(Special to The Guardian) NEW YORK, March 19.—General John J. Pershing, speaking before a crowd which packed Madison Square Garden tonight at one of the greatest patriotic demonstrations here since the signing of the armistice, bitterly denounced persons of foreign birth who seek the freedom of the United States to spread "political and war-like propaganda" to weaken the ties of friendship between the United States and her allies in the late war.
