ARMISTICE DAY

Tomorrow, November 11th, will be Armistice Day, a day never to be forgotten in the history of the world, a day that will be forever glorious in the history of the British Empire of Canada...

The day should be a holy one, we are giving but two minutes' silence. It is little and yet even two minutes of reverent serious thought in the midst of our business anxieties and strenuous life will be at least a tribute to them and may be saving grace to us.

In commemoration of the day, provision has been made to enable all citizens to show their sympathy, their gratitude, their joy and their sorrow by wearing a boutonniere of Flanders poppy which has been adopted as "Canada's Flower of Remembrance"...

The wearing of the poppy on Armistice Day and on Sunday next, during the special services in the city churches, will serve the double purpose of honouring our dead and assisting the destitute living in France and Flanders where thousands of children robbed by the war of parents and homes and livelihood are maintained by the proceeds of charities of which this is but one...

We trust that no one will go without the poppy boutonniere emblem commemorating a sacred cause, and a sacred sacrifice.

RECIPROCITY FALLACY

Our Liberal friends when on the stump in the present campaign give an occasional oration on the benefits of reciprocity, so called and the Patriot a few days ago, gave a resume of an "excellent speech" delivered by Mr. J. J. Hughes in King's County purporting to demonstrate the value of the American markets to Canadians...

We have exported annually some \$168,000,000 of farm products to the United States while we have been importing from them \$80,000,000 of their products and having them sold in our markets in competition with our own...

Those who truly love never die. Though year by year the sad memorial wreath, A ring and flowers, types of life and death, Are laid upon their graves.

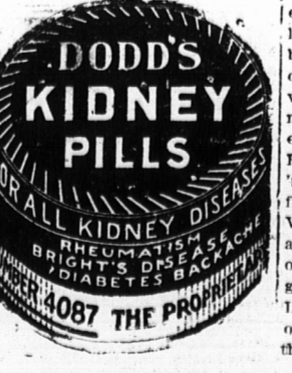
For death the pure life saves, A dear one is love, and love can reach From heaven to earth, and noble lessons teach Than those by mortals read.
