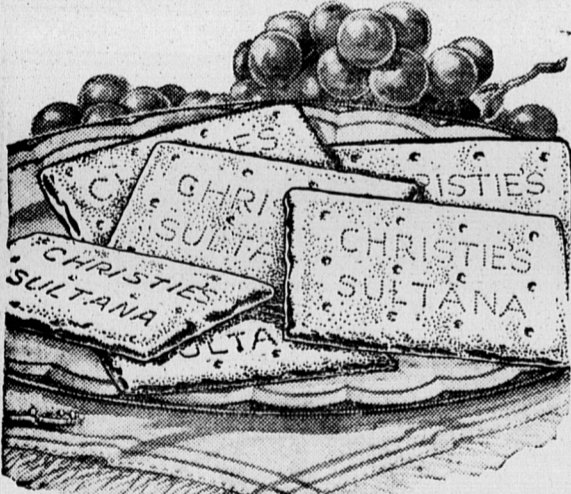

—SPOKE ON FOX DISEASES—Dr. Wickware of the Dominion Department of Agriculture at Ottawa who has been working at the Experimental Station, Summerside, gave an interesting address at the annual meeting of the Farmers and Dairymen's Association at Fredericton, N. B., last week on diseases peculiar to ranch bred foxes. Through the courtesy of the United States Bureau of Biological Survey at Washington, Dr. Wickware showed three films dealing with the fox bred in captivity. Two gave illustrations of the care and management of foxes. The other film dealt with the disease "Epigotic Encephalitis" which has appeared in ranch bred foxes at different places in the United States and Canada. This disease, which has only recently developed in foxes kept in captivity, has caused the officials of both countries to undertake a thorough investigation of the condition with a view to minimizing the losses from this and other diseases. In regard to Epigotic Encephalitis Dr. Green and his associates of the University of Minnesota, who are working in conjunction with the officials of the United States Biological Survey have definitely demonstrated the cause of this disease and are now devoting their attention to finding a means of preventing such outbreaks.—S

—JUDGMENT GIVEN IN SHEEP KILLING CASE—The December Term of the County Court of Prince

County which has been in session since Dec. 19th, was adjourned sine die on Wednesday morning when the case of Harry Sobey vs. Thomas W. Bradshaw and William Roberts was completed. This was an action for \$100.00 damages for the alleged killing of nine sheep and two lambs by the dogs of the defendants on 31st Oct. last. Judge Inman in giving judgment stated that as the plaintiff and a witness had seen the dogs lying in the field near the dead sheep on Oct. 31st last he came to the conclusion that the dogs killed the sheep and that they belonged to the defendants from the description which had been given. The plaintiff had left the carcasses of the sheep in the field to rot and the Judge stated he should have dressed the sheep which had been killed immediately and made an effort to sell same for fox meat. Not having done this he would reduce the damages and would allow the plaintiff \$60 Mr. Ernest Strong, K.C., for the plaintiff, Heath Strong, K.C., for the defendant.—S

—REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER—In his report as health officer for the Town of Summerside, Dr. E. T. Tanton stated that six houses had been quarantined for diphtheria. The cases were in children of pre school age and one or two older people. This demonstrates the value of the Toxoid treatment inaugurated in our school and convent and justifies the expenditure made by the Town Council for Toxoid. We are endeavoring to establish a health centre at Summerside and will report all infectious diseases to the Provincial Board of Health and will co-operate with the Red Cross and their official here. Miss Zinck, while on duty here was certainly most obliging and active and merits our sincere thanks. Dr. Tanton also made reference to the dumps and fox pens as breeders of flies and causes of odors.—S

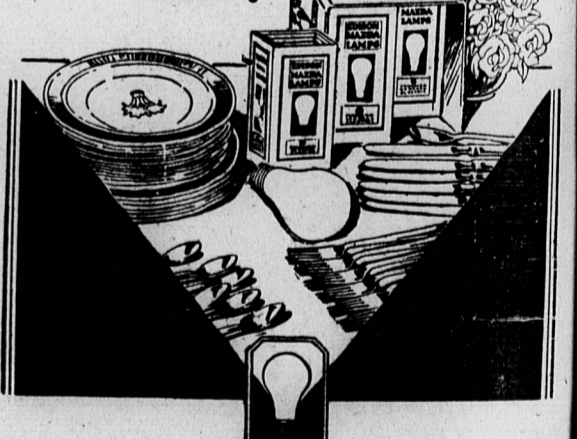
