OF SPECIAL INTEREST

LONDON, August 14 (Special).—The Standard publishes an article by "Traveller" on "British Naval Power in the Pacific," remarking that it does not necessarily endorse his views. The writer holds that a prominent place must be given to the questions of the defense of commerce in the Pacific and the maintenance of the balance of power. Dr. Vrooman had done much in British Columbia in educating public opinion and stimulating a practical investigation. Even as, to thinkers in Australia, the question of the yellow peril was a real one, so did their fellow subjects in British Columbia feel their problem. The Empires Pacific gate faced a land teeming with western peoples.

BERLIN, Aug. 26 (Special).—Princess Nicholas of Thurn and Taxis, in Bavaria, who recently renounced his royal rights and titles to become plain Baron von Hochstadt, is engaged to a Munich actress, Fraulein Carolina Reichenberger. PARIS, August 14 (Special).—Religious fanaticism caused a terrible tragedy at a farm near Avignon, a farmer, his wife, and three children, aged 29, 25 and 19, and a grand-mother of 80, lived there. One day the eldest daughter, Julie, asserted that she was possessed by Satan. Every day she had a new tale about the devil in whose power she believed herself to be. The other members of the family, with the exception of the grand-mother, were so worked upon by her statements that at last they believed her.

Yesterday she lay on the floor and began crying: "Go away, Satan, Go away." Suddenly her brother's sisters and parents joined the performance, and all began to cry, "Demon, go away!" The grand-mother tried to comfort them, but they bound her to her armchair and then returned to the girl and shouted, "Demon go away!" and beat the poor girl's head till it was an unrecognizable mass.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (Special).—That the Chinese revolution has failed, but that disorders still threaten, is reported by Rear Admiral R. R. Nicholson, U. S. N., commanding the Asiatic fleet at Shanghai, from whom this report was today received by cable at the Navy Department.

The president's uprising in China has met with failure at every point up to the present and the northern troops have been uniformly successful, but the country is far from pacific. Kuling is now within the northern lines. The conditions are satisfactory there. Nanking has renounced adhesion to the south, but disorders are threatened there owing to the large number of troops formerly southern but now attached to either side.

An American steamship was fired upon by southern troops at Chung-Ling. Ample reparation has been made.
