There remain two other important "national" archbishoprics to be filled, that of Ireland, left vacant by the death of Cardinal O'Donnell, and that of Lisbon, Portugal, vacated by the recent demise of Cardinal Mendes Bello.

Among the Italians the names of Monsignor Lavitrano, Archbishop of Palermo; Monsignor Facelli, Paganico to Berlin; Monsignor Marchetti Selvaggini, Secretary of the great missionary organization for the Propagation of the Faith, Monsignor Tedeschi, Nuncio at Madrid, and Monsignor Caecilia Dominoli, Pagan Chamberlain, are prominently mentioned.

It is understood that the Pope will not create a new United States Cardinal at the coming Consistories. It is believed that an Irish Cardinal will be nominated.

The fungus or mold causing this well known disease attacks and kills the potato tubers usually during the late summer. It spreads rapidly in moist weather, and spores from the diseased leaves fall to the ground where they come into contact with the tubers and decay follows.
