THE YOUNG MAN'S VIEW POINT.

The Guardian has received a copy of a letter written by a nineteen year old son, then at college, to his father, on learning that the latter had accepted a nomination as a candidate for the Provincial Legislature. Here is the letter:

Dear Father,—I see by the papers that you have been nominated to contest the District of—County. To say that I am surprised is putting it very mildly indeed, for I thought that politics and you were two distinct things. In fact I thought that you were too wise to attempt the like, but alas, like many another find myself in the wrong. It seems to me that your business will suffer to a very great extent by your rash act. However you should know better than I, though I doubt it very much.

I am very very sorry that you have allowed yourself to enter the political arena but since you are in it I hope you will be successful and triumph in the Conservative cause. But remember to fight a clean battle. I would much rather see you fight a clean battle and be defeated than see you elected by corrupt means. I know you will not stain your good name by dishonest work of any kind. Who are you opposed to? The papers give rather a confused account of it. I would like to know for sure. Please do not regard this letter as the outburst of a foolish boy but rather as your son who wishes to see you elected by honest means and a good majority.

The above letter is of interest as showing a young man's view of politics and political life, and we may add that there will always be hope for the land whose young men set so high a value upon honesty and integrity in public life. We trust there are many among our young men and College students who would prefer defeat to a victory obtained by corrupt means.

If the discovery of gold in the Klondyke should be followed hereafter by the discovery of diamonds in the region between the Great Lakes and Hudson Bay, as Dr. Ami of the Geological Department predicts, it would be a great boon as well as a splendid advertisement for Canada. As yet no man can venture to predict what vast stores of mineral wealth may yet be disclosed in the unexplored north land of the Dominion.

SUMMER TOURISTS.

J. C. Hall of the Acadia Hotel writes The Guardian under date of Winthrop, Me. March 15th, to say that more attention should be given to exploiting the summer tourist business; that where we now have one visitor we ought to have hundreds; that during the hot term the whole American coast from New Jersey to Bar Harbor is thronged with hundreds of thousands of tourists; that if we had more and hotels and facilities to get to them the Island, with its attractions would draw a large number hither where now but few come. And more of the wealthy class would establish summer homes here as has been done by Mr. McDonald of Dalway. If the Island furnishes a desirable summer residence for Mr. McDonald, who in addition to his great wealth receives a fixed salary of \$200,000 and expenses from the Standard Oil Company, it would with proper attention attract other millionaires by the score to likewise make their homes with us in summer.

We want the tunnel and until it is built we want another and more powerful winter steamer. The Minister of Marine has apparently no very great faith in ice-breaking steamers of whatever power. This is no doubt due to the experiences of the Minto Stanley and Montcalm and the reports of their officers during the passing winter. With us the general opinion is that a powerful steamer, well equipped and energetically operated might greatly improve our service. It would, however be useless for Canada to purchase any more winter steamers such as the three we now have. Something much more powerful is demanded. The point we sought to make yesterday was that the Minister's doubt as to what winter steamers can do affords a strong argument for the construction of the tunnel as speedily as possible.
