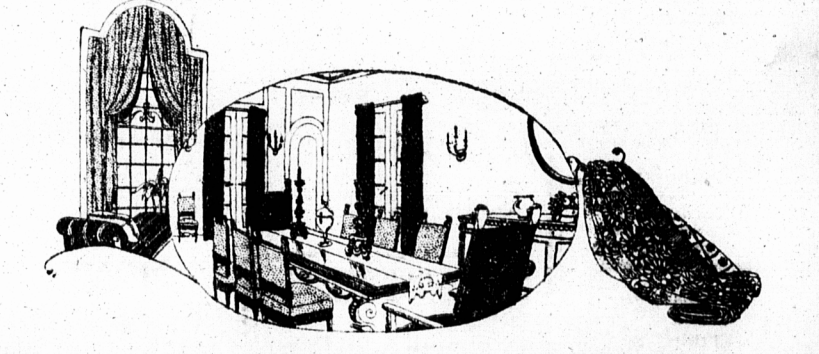

—Mrs. Elmer Dunning, came up from Charlottetown, Monday on a visit to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Morrison.

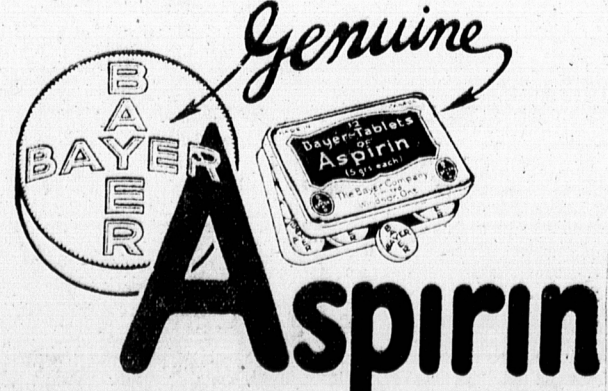
—Mr. Wm. McGreor, of Lot 16, left Monday for Toronto to attend a meeting of the Grain Growers' Association.
