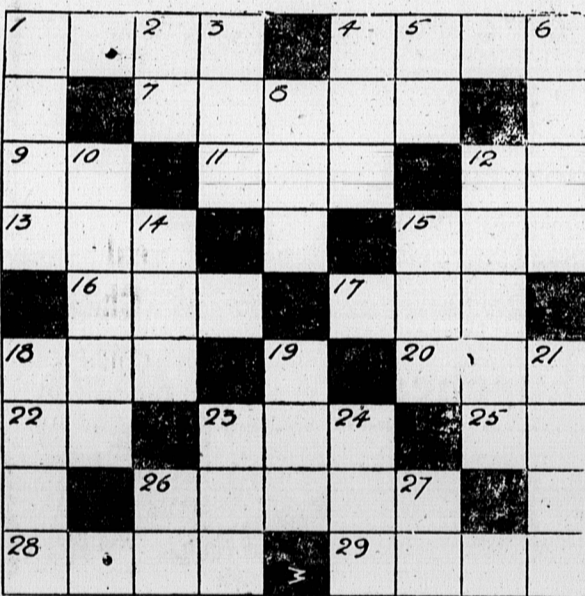

We think we have sufficiently exposed the hollowness, the hypocrisy, and we might say the childishness of the Patriot's attempt to now broadcast the seeds of dissension and suspicion between the dwellers of town and country. It is a pretty small business, and we believe that the Patriot will receive little countenance for it, even from the leaders of its own party. It is time that such rank mischief-makers were frowned upon and discontinued.

Charlottetown, as a matter of fact, is only one of the five electoral districts comprising Queen's County. Its delegates at the convention would only be a mere fraction of the whole. Of these delegates the farmers comprised the great majority. It was their business to nominate whom they pleased. There were several farmer candidates put in nomination and because the farmer delegates refused to vote for them must they be jeered at and insulted by a city publication evidently enraged at the popularity and strength of the ticket chosen? The farmer delegates if they felt so disposed could nominate two farmer candidates. That they did not do so is no business of the Patriot.

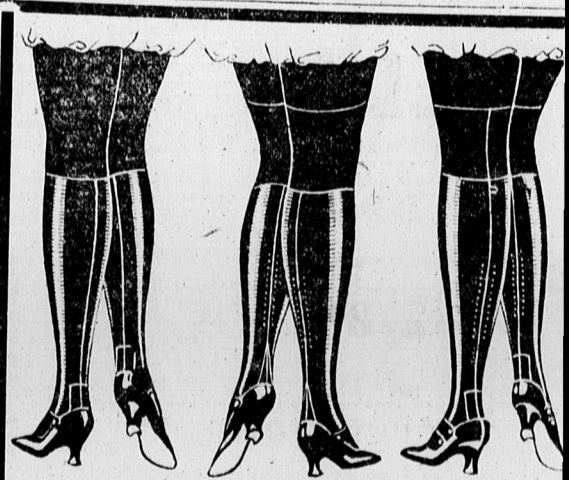

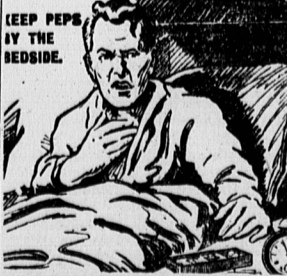
