Enthusiasm prevailed throughout. The chairman of the evening was Rev. J. A. Greenless and the speakers were Mr. L. W. Shaw, Mr. John A. MacDonald, Mrs. A. J. Macdonald and Rev. J. A. Greenless.

...FUNERAL SERVICES... The funeral of the late Mrs. David B.S. Johnstone took place on Monday, May 7th at 10 o'clock. The attendance was large for Mrs. Johnstone was perhaps the oldest resident in Montague and all felt that it was the passing away of one who had been in the village before most of them were born. The service was conducted by the Rev. David Wright, Minister of St. Andrew's Church of which Mrs. Johnstone was a devoted member and a regular attendant. The Rev. Mr. Hubley and St. Andrew's Church Choir assisted the Minister. Mrs. Johnstone was born in Orwell 86 years ago, she was married in 1858 to David B.S. Johnstone of Cumberland Hill, Dundas. Mrs. Johnstone's father-in-law was a Sergeant in the famous Highland Regiment the 42nd or the "Forty-two". He fought at Waterloo and his sword is in possession of his grandson, Wellington Johnstone of Montague. Mrs. Johnstone and her husband, who predeceased her by about 30 years, came to Montague about 50 years ago and located at the end of Montague Bridge and there she was a land mark for nearly half a century. They were ten children Mrs. Dr. Ellis, deceased; Mrs. John Mellish of Montague; William J., of Salem, Oregon; Dr. Barclay Johnstone deceased; Mrs. Stewart, Winthrop, Mass., Miss Minnie F., deceased; Mrs. W. D. McIntyre, Charlottetown; Wellington and a girl who died in infancy and Montague S., in Alaska. There are three grandsons at the front. One has given his life and now sleeps in a little cemetery in Belgium. She was the oldest in business in Montague. Her dear and kindly face will be greatly missed. Hers was a beautiful and consistent Christian life. Her presence will be missed from the Church, for while able she was always there.—B.

COMMANDER EVANS TO DIRECT U. S. FLEET

LONDON, Commanded Edward R. G. R. Evans, who was second in command of the Scott Antarctic expedition and was in charge of the British destroyer Broke when she, with another destroyer, defeated six German destroyers of Dover on the night of April 20, has been assigned to advisory duty with the American destroyer squadron in British waters. He went aboard the destroyer officer vessel as soon as the destroyers arrived and will keep in close touch with him, giving that officer practical advice on all matters concerning strategy, technique and the latest methods of submarine warfare. The appointment of Commander Evans was received with the greatest enthusiasm by the American forces.



WITH THE MEN IN FRANCE. The following letter was written by Mr. Robert Perry to his daughter, Mr. Perry, 101, Charlottetown, with the 104th Band, but was transferred to working Battalion to work at his trade and went to France some months ago.
France, April 25, 1917.
Dear Lily,
Just received your letter of March 11th, and am very glad to hear from you. Last week I got seven letters from Mamma and you were all old ones of February, some of them were nearly destroyed by the wet but I managed to read them. Mamma sent me some parcels but I have not received them yet and may never get them. I would love to get things from home but I think you had better not send any as it's only a waste of money as most of the parcels never get here. Did your hockey team beat the Summerside girls in the other match? I have not heard a word from any of the 104th since I left them in January so I cannot give you any news about them.
So you are learning Algebra! It's a pretty hard study but it's quite interesting and I have no doubt you will like it fine.
Well dear the weather is good here now but we had some very nasty weather. We are camped near a large town which has been completely destroyed by the Huns. The Cathedral must have been a very fine one but scarcely any of it remains standing. The convent on the part that remains is now used as a hospital. It is a very large convent and the chapel is all destroyed but the statue of the Blessed Virgin and that of St. Joseph remain intact. The war news is very good now, we are driving them back and I hope and believe that the war will be over soon. I am feeling fine and hope you are also well. I like my work fine. There are four of us one for each company and at present we are all together, but sometimes our companies go to one place and the other to another. I suppose it will be moving to another camp soon. That is the fifth one since coming to France. I would like to tell you where we are but that is against the rules, but when I go home will have something to tell you about the things and places I have seen. I wrote a letter to Mamma two days ago hope she gets it. Well this letter is all for the present so will have to close. Good bye and God bless you. Pray for Me, Love and kisses from your loving
