THE OLD GARDENER SAYS

Spanish cardoon is a stranger to most American vegetable gardeners. It is well worth getting acquainted with. Across the water it is a favorite vegetable, being grown for its crisp leaf stalks, which can be blanched in much the same way as celery and then stewed or used in soups or salads. If the seed is sown now you will have no trouble in getting a crop, but you must have rich soil and an open situation. The occasional use of a little liquid manure will help to keep the plants growing and in September they will be large enough to blanch. A package of seed will be enough, at least for the first season's experiments.

In Memoriam

MR. WILLIAM F. H. CARVELL.

The death occurred in this city Tuesday of William Frederick Harrison Carvell, aged fifty-eight. The deceased, who was a Barrister-at-Law was well known in this city. He was a generous hearted gentleman, intensely fond of outdoor sports. He greatly enjoyed cricket and was a famous player, being long identified with the Phoenix Club. For some years he was a member of the Hillsborough Boat Club. Mr. Carvell came of a family who were at one time actively and prominently associated with the commercial and public life of this province; his father, the late Hon. J. S. Carvell, was the founder and head of the firm of Carvell Bros. and Co., and a member of the Council of this province. Mr. Carvell was for many years a member of St. John's Lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. M., Alexandria Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, Prince Edward Preceptory Knights Templar and Luxor Shrine Temple of St. John. The funeral took place on Friday morning at 8.30 a. m. from St. Peter's Cathedral. To his widow, only daughter, Miss Mary, and brother F. Parker Carvell, Montreal, the sympathy of many friends will be extended.

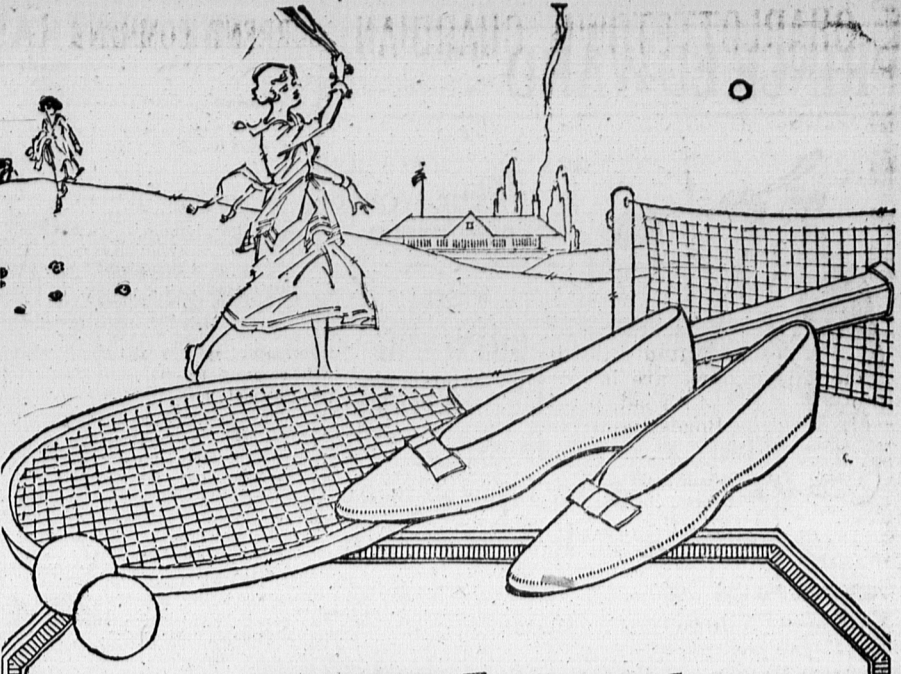

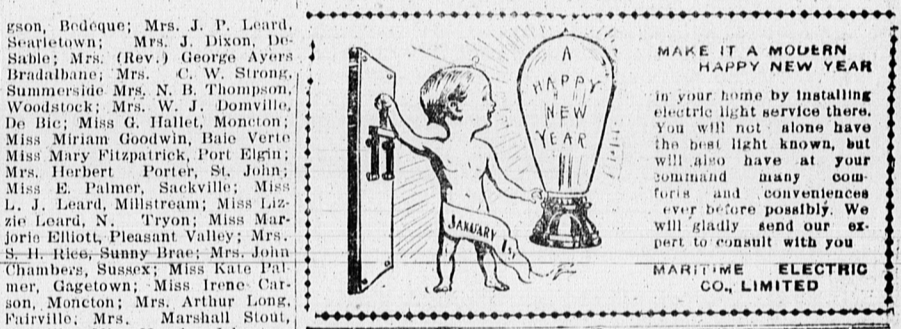
