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SHIPPING LIVE STOCK

A second meeting of the Eastern Committee on the Efficient Hand-

ling of Live Stock was recently held in Toronto and was attended by a large number of members. Previous to the meeting observations had been made at Toronto and Montreal Stockyards by members of the Committee as to the actual conditions of live stock on arrival at these two markets, and a report was presented showing the number of cars observed, their contents, method and efficiency of partitions used, if any, number of injured animals, damage done to cars through erection and removal of temporary partitions. This report strengthened the representations previously made.

on behalf of improved facilities for separating the various classes of stock in mixed cars, and the committee decided to ask the Railways, through their representative on the committee, to fit up a few cars with movable partitions to determine their efficiency and practicability under actual tests. It was decided to increase the number of members on the Committee by the addition of two more members and Mr. J. M. Wilson of the S. P. C. A., Toronto, and Mr. W. H. Maher of the Stockyard, Montreal were elected to fill the positions.
