—A GOOD HINT.—The current issue of the St. John, N. B., Board of Trade Bulletin says in part:—"As the outcome of the last conference of farmers and business men, a Director of your Board did finance the venture of a farmer in the poultry business. The result has been most gratifying. The venture grew apace; and the farmer's son who had decided to his citywards—has decided to stay on the land. He has demonstrated that intelligent poultry raising is attractively worthwhile." Here is a useful hint for the married men of Summerside as well as other parts of the Island, who are wont at times to talk about the necessity of a better understanding between business men and farmers and to deplore the migration of our young people and yet do nothing about it. Much of our idle capital which now finds its way into wild cat and other schemes abroad might, as the above instance shows, be more profitably employed in financing P. E. Island's basic industry and the most stable business in the world—Agriculture.—S.

—CALLED TO MIND.—Mr. F. R. Bowness, of Summerside, is the proud possessor of a Hazard Map of P. E. Island, dated 1863 and in an excellent state of preservation. In it every town and village is mapped, with the names of the streets and the names of the owner of each and every house at that date given. The map, which is six feet long, is of the roller type and in each lot or township the roads are marked and the names of all the owners of farm and other property are given, together with the acreage of each farm. Of the property owners named at Summerside at that time not one so far as Mr. Bowness knows, and he is 83 years young, is now living. The leading shipyards at Summerside, as shown on this map were then in F. C. Pope, Richard Hunt, John Lefurgey, Angus McMillan and James Muirhead. There were then in 1863 Mr. Bowness recalls, 17 vessels on the stocks here at one time, ranging up to slightly over 1000 tons. They included the barque Charles E. Lefurgey, 900 tons and quite celebrated in her day. At or about that time other noted large vessel built at Summerside were the full ricked ship Gladiola, 1000 tons; the Railway King, over 900 tons; the New Dominion, of about the same tonnage, and others, mostly in the names of the streets. Few schooners were built then, or until after the large timber became scarce. Mr. Bowness, who then lived at Norboro, used to haul oats to Summerside when the axle of the truck-carts would drag in the mud in places on Water Street—some difference to the magnificent concrete street of today. Oats sold then for one shilling and six pence, equivalent to 24 cents, the measured bushel. The warehouse for the oats was where the Clifton House now stands. In those times there were twelve taverns at Summerside, besides numerous other places at which liquor could be obtained at three pence (about five cents) a glass. Mr. Bowness says it was good liquor at that; and there was no "hog-mark" on the glass. On the whole the liquor store at Summerside was completely consumed, in 1861, the taverns all placed buckets of rum outside their premises, free for all to help themselves, without government or any other control; and Mr. Bowness says that only one man, and he a young one, was the worse for liquor.—S.
