SILVER FOXES SELL WELL—A fair collection of silver foxes sold exceedingly well, with almost 100 per cent of the offering being taken, at yesterday's auction conducted by Lampton, Fraser & Huth, Inc. Full silvers were up 10 per cent from the preceding sale, with a \$60 top; three-quarters up 20 per cent, with a \$50 top; halves up 25 per cent, \$34 top; quarters up 25 per cent, \$25 top, and darks off 10 per cent, \$15 top. A fair collection of mink sold well, with 60 per cent being taken. Ranch mink was up 5 per cent, with a \$14.75 top, and wild mink was off 5 per cent, with a \$12 top. Beaver sold well, a fair collection going at an increase of 10 per cent, with a \$24 top, 65 per cent of the offering being sold.—New York Times.

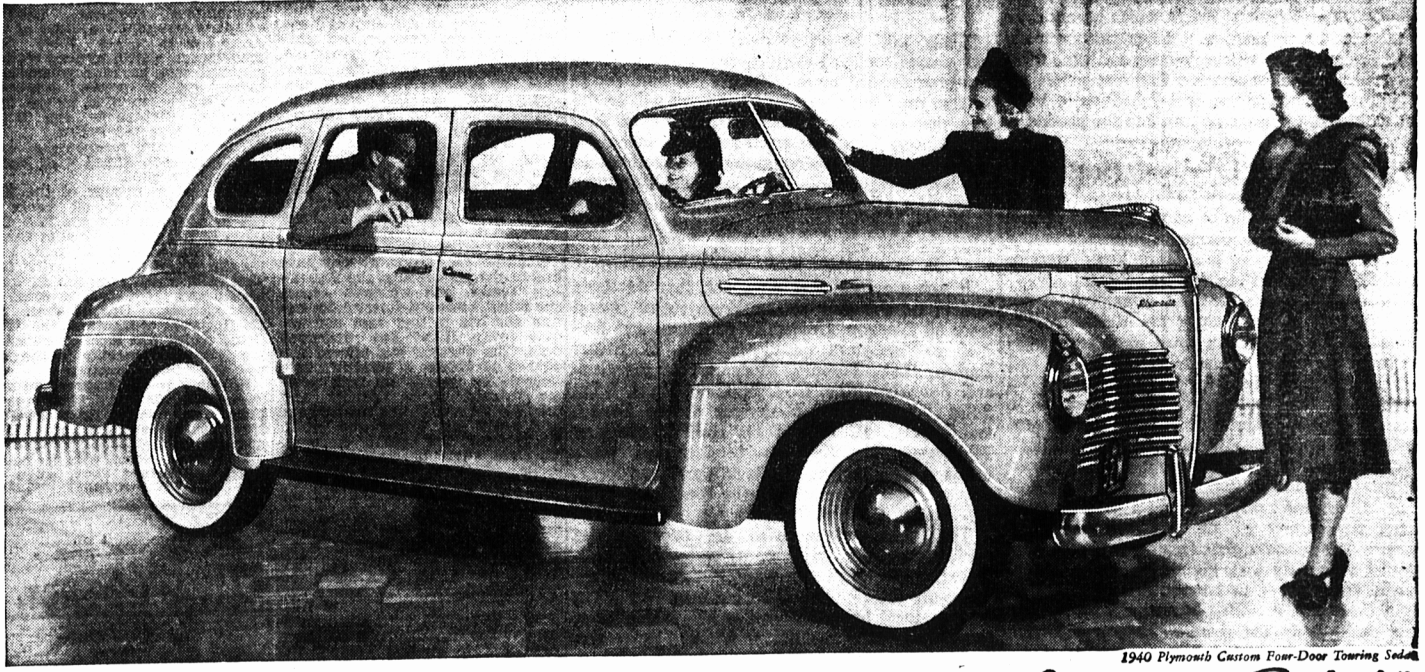
