OTTAWA, April 25.—The compulsory medical examination of the Canadian people at least once a year loomed tonight as a possible recommendation of the first Dominion-Provincial health conference which, under the chairmanship of Col. the Hon. Dr. M. McLaughlin, Minister of National Health, opened here today. Linked with this was the emphasis placed by all conferees on the need for educating the public in the personal advantages of such annual examination as a preventive measure against disease.

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Corrects False Statement In Liberal Press

Full responsibility for the frost damage caused in a section of experimental sand-asphalt road built last Fall at Southport, is assumed by the contractors, the Modern Paving Company, Mr. H. J. Crawford, manager in charge of the work, stated to a Guardian representative yesterday. Mr. Crawford's attention was called to a statement in the local Liberal press that the government had sent men out to repair this section of road. This statement he branded as absolutely incorrect. The contracting company is itself making the necessary repairs, at no expense to the government.
