EDITORIAL NOTES.

THE GUARDIAN regrets to announce the death of Rev. Douglas H. Lodge. He had been confined to his bed two years with paralysis. He was taken worse on Thursday last and died at noon yesterday. His son Lloyd returned from Sackville in time to see him before he died. A widow, two sons and a daughter survive and will have the hearty sympathy of all. The Official Board of the 1st Methodist Church, of which the deceased was assistant pastor before his illness, have drafted a letter of condolence to the bereaved ones. The organ played the Dead March at the close of last night's meeting and a memorial service will be held next Sunday evening in tribute to the worth of the departed minister. Many will mourn for the devout Christian gentleman, who gave his years of strength to doing good and afterward suffered long with most exemplary patience.
