**HEIRS SEEK SHARE OF BUCHANAN MILLIONS**  
FAYETTEVILLE, Tenn., July 21. (U.P.)—Frank B. Kelso, Lincoln County registered, is having a busy time answering queries in regard to an \$850,000,000 estate. More than 300 Lincoln County people claim to be direct descendants of William Buchanan, a cousin of President James Buchanan and believe themselves entitled to a share in the Buchanan estate. The property, consisting of real estate in New York, Pennsylvania, North and South Carolina, Kentucky and Tennessee, has been leased for 99 years and reverts back to the owners this year. In addition to local queries, Kelso has had requests for aid in tracing "family trees" from scores of people in such scattered places as Houston, Tex.; Montgomery and Birmingham, Ala.; Louisville, Ky., and the states of California, New York, Indiana, Oregon, Washington, Arkansas and Florida.

### TO END MARINE TRAINING IN 1932

MANAGUA, July 21.—(U.P.)—If present plans are carried out, the organization and training of the Nicaraguan National Guard, the country's new military force, will be completed by 1933 and the Guard will be turned over to the Nicaraguan Government. By that time, under the present scheme, all of the U. S. Marines now on duty here will have been withdrawn.

The National Guard numbers 2-100 officers and men, and the Military Academy near Managua is training Nicaraguan officers, graduating a class every six months. These graduates are commissioned second lieutenants.

The National Guard is a smartly-appearing organization, uniformed and equipped similarly to the Marines. Many Marine officers feel, however, that they should be given a longer time to train the organization. One Marine officer, serving with the Guard, thinks ten years would be an adequate period. He remarked that enlisted men in the Marines are rarely well-trained or competent to act as non-commissioned officers until after their first enlistment of four years.

As a war to end war it was a fizzle, but as a peace to end peace this one is doing very well.
