Running Race (open to the world) best two in three heats. Purse \$50.00. Special train carrying race horses and passengers leaves Charlottetown at 9:00 A. M. for New Annan—Returning after races.

Entries close SATURDAY, July 20th, 1929. Entrance money must accompany the entry. Horses must be eligible on that date.

Entrance fee 5% of purse, which must accompany each entry. Five per cent deduction from money winners. No horse named unless these conditions are complied with.

All races mile heats; to be raced on the 3-heat plan, viz: 10% of each purse will be awarded the winner, the remainder to be divided in three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat-winners, they shall race a fourth heat to determine the winner of the event.

The management reserves the right to declare off, change order of programme, decline any entry, bar any driver, declare off and fill without re-advancing, any races not satisfactorily filled.

If weather is stormy, or track is in unfavorable condition so that racing cannot be carried on at the time advertised the management reserve the right to postpone or declare the races off, and return the entrance monies.
