AMHERST CLUB WINS FROM CHYTOWN CLUB

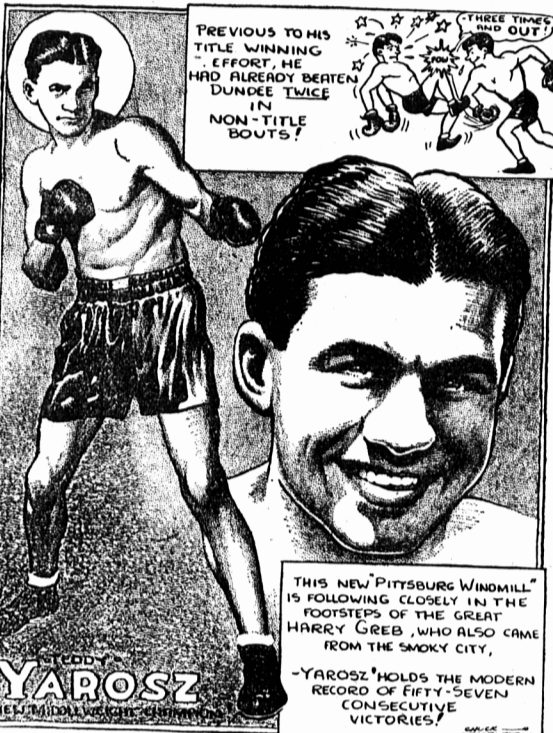
Many Good Scores Made in Inter-club Golf Match.

Rainbow Leads Endeavour Along 30 Mile Ocean Course In Faint Breeze

Defender, Sailed By Harold S. Vanderbilt, Gained An Early Lead Which She Increased To Half-mile When Race Was Called.

(By Andrew Merkel, Canadian Press Staff Writer) (C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 16—The contenders for the America's Cup, Harold S. Vanderbilt's defender Rainbow and T. O. M. Sopwith's Endeavour, the British challenger, swung idly at their moorings today during a Sunday lull in the international sailing rivalry.

The respite was turned over to a recapitulation of their first meeting yesterday, when a faint breeze prevented either from finishing within the 5 1-2 hour time limit, although the defender led the challenger around practically the entire 30-mile open ocean course.

Rainbow was leading Endeavour by a three-eighths of a mile when the time limit expired. When the committee boat signalled no contest by lowering a red ball the New York Yacht Club's defender was more than a mile from the finish line.

As she made for her mooring Rainbow made its appearance in the sky. It may prove a happy augury for the defender in the series but it broke too late for yesterday's encounter.

The race, a 15-mile beat to windward and return, was sailed under leaden skies in a wind from the southeast that, held fairly true but never rose above eight knots. It was not finished mainly because Rainbow, with Endeavour following, her lead drifted to leeward of the course and finally had to reach for the line.

Despite the glamour attached to the name of the late Sir Thomas Lipton, five times challenger for the America's Cup, more interest than ever attended his series of five Shamrocks is being shown in the current sailing controversy.

Tomorrow the contenders will be sent away again on a 15-mile beat to windward and return, or the reverse, if conditions permit.

Much of the great spectator fleet maintained in Newport Harbor for resumption of the contest. Numerically the fleet showed an increase in interest over all previous races and the presence of the President of the United States among the spectators was itself unusual.

BRITISH WOMEN GOLFERS DOWN CANADIANS

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Sept. 16—"On to Washington and the Curtis Cup match," was the battle cry tonight of the British women golf internationalists, following their decisive victory over Canada yesterday in the first team match played between all-star squads representing the two countries. Britain won 8 1-2 points to 3 1-2.

Although Canada's fighting troupe of eight players succeeded in winning only two matches and halving three, they were in the battle right down the stretch, dropping the decision in some of the duels by a wayward drive or two or a lapse around the greens.

"I think we were rather fortunate in winning by such a margin," was the tribute offered by Miss Doris Chambers, captain of the British team. "The Canadian girls played wonderfully and I hope we have a chance of meeting them again."

Later this month Miss Chambers will take her charges to Washington where the Britons meet the United States international team in a return match for the Curtis Cup, which the Americans won in England two years ago.
