Farewell

ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION TO REV MRS MAURICE McDONALD, TRACADIE

On the evening of November 30th, over four hundred of the parishioners and friends of Mgr Maurice McDonald attended a supper and smoker in St. Bonaventure Hall, Tracadie, in his honor and to say farewell to this beloved priest, on the eve of his departure to the parish of Vernon River.

At the head table sat the honored guest of the evening, Mgr McDonald, the presiding officer. Mr. Louis McDonald and the trustees of the parishes of St. Bonaventure and St. Michael. At the conclusion of supper the following address was read by Mr. J. J. Trainor, Tracadie, November 29th, 1937.

Rev and dear Mgr. McDonald—There are occasions in the life of every parish marked by emotions of deep joy and happiness or great sorrow and regret. Tonight your beloved people of the parishes of St. Bonaventure, Tracadie and of St. Michael, gathered here assembled to bid you a fond farewell.

When it became known that your priestly duties were to be transferred to another parish all our hearts filled with feelings of sadness. Almost five years ago, after the death of our former pastor, the saintly Rev. John B. McIntyre, you were assigned to the care of those two parishes. You came to us as a people little known to you. With that great energy and zeal that we now know to be characteristic of you, you immediately and wholeheartedly undertook the spiritual and material advancement of our people. In your great zeal of the greater honor and glory of God, you re-organized into active societies different groups of religious bodies, clothed with responsibilities and opportunities for every individual placed under your pastoral care, viz: The Catholic Women's League, The Children of Mary, The Holy Name Society and The League of the Sacred Heart. All provide opportunities for the Co-operation of every individual in the salvation of souls. Your great energy has been used to keep those societies alive and active.

While we appreciate the fact that we have not measured up to the extent we would wish, we flatter ourselves with the hope that we have made substantial progress. Regardless of weather or road conditions and often with danger to your health, you have always celebrated the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass in both parishes every Sunday during your stay amongst us. Personal considerations have never interfered with your duties as you understood them. By word and example you have been an inspiration to all. You choose encouragement and example for the uplifting of your people with never a word of public condemnation. Our faults have always been covered with the mantle of your great charity. Evils have always been condemned but never the poor sinner.

Your efforts have also been directed toward the material prosperity of your people and the community. Under your guidance progress has been made through Study Clubs in all our school districts. A good beginning has been made in establishing Credit Unions in both parishes. Your timely advice in the encouragement of thrift and co-operative efforts will, we hope, bear abundant fruit in the years to come.

We beg to assure you our poor prayers will follow you to your new field of labor and we most humbly ask your remembrance in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

We ask you to kindly accept this small token of our affection and appreciation.

Fitting re-

ference was also made to the good work of two former pastors, the late Rev. John B. McIntyre and Rev. P. D. McGulgan. Pleasing piano selections were furnished by Misses Marie Paquet and Marion Mitchell and vocal numbers by Messrs. Clarence Pineau and Severinus Arsenault of Charlottetown.

Mrs. Nicholson was one of the most highly respected citizens of the district and her cheery smile and kindly disposition gave evidence of the fine character and Christian faith and fortitude that were her dearest and most cherished possessions.

The funeral services, which were under the direction of the Reverend G. Carlyle Webster of Zion Church, Charlottetown, were held in the Presbyterian Church, Hunter River, on Monday, December 2nd, at 11 o'clock. Mrs. Nicholson worshipped and of which she was a valued member. Favorite hymns of the deceased "Oh God our Help in Ages Past," "Peace, Perfect Peace" and "Abide with Me," were sung and Mr. Gordon Carew rendered very effectively the number "No Shadows Yonder."

There are left to mourn three daughters, Mrs. Charles Ozler, Boston, Mass.; Mrs. Edward Saunders, Western Canada and Mrs. Harry Pursey, of North Rustico, and four sons, James, Bathurst, N. B.; Norman, Newport, Vermont; Robert, Boston, Mass.; and Wilfred of Mayfield, P. E. Island. Two brothers also survive Messrs. Robert and Donald Andrews both residing on the Island.

The pall-bearers were Messrs. Robert Smith, Ira Rackham, John Andrews, James Andrews, George Smith and Duncan Nicholson. Interment was made in the cemetery at Hunter River.

Fly Service Is Interrupted

CANBERRA, Australia, Dec. 2-(CP-reuters)—The flyingboat service, originally scheduled to start early in January between England and Australia, has struck a temporary snag. Its inauguration may be delayed until next summer.

Prime Minister Joseph Lyons attributed the postponement to uncontrollable circumstances.

Final views of the British Government regarding the nature and extent of the ground organization for the service, he said, had not been received until Nov. 15. As a result the Australian Government had found it inadvisable to start construction work on bases at Karamba and Grooteylandt during the approaching season. The work would probably start early next April.

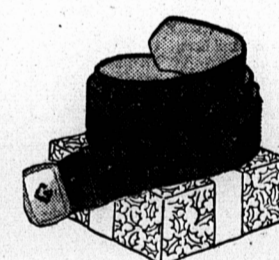
