1,100 ROTARIANS SAIL  
NEW YORK, May 31.—Bishop William T. Manning of the Episcopal Church today was the principal speaker at a luncheon given by the New York Rotary Club in honor of the 1,100 Rotarians of Canada and the United States who will sail tomorrow on the steamers Caronia and Cameronia for Great Britain. The delegates will represent the Associated Rotary Clubs of America at the twelfth annual convention of International Rotarians to be held in Edinburgh, Scotland, June 13-16.  
Bishop Manning praised the overseas mission of the Rotarians and said it undoubtedly would have a great influence in cementing the friendship of the nation. A letter from President Harding expressed his regret at his inability to attend the luncheon. He asked the delegates to accept a brief message in testimony of his sincere interest in their mission. The Edinburgh convention of the Rotarians will be the first ever held outside the United States, and the British Rotarians have planned an extensive programme for their guests' entertainment.
