It is to be used for spraying perfume and bay rum, for drying the face after shaving, for blowing away loose hair and in connection with a vibrator for massaging. The power is supplied by a water motor and the compressed air is kept in a boiler which with all the other apparatus is underneath the floor. All to be seen in the parlors is silken hose attached to the wall through which the compressed air is forced. The entire apparatus was purchased from the Cleveland Faucet Co. and is being installed by Bruce Stewart & Co. It will be in operation for the first time on Saturday.
