the loveliest coins of antiquity which artists have admired for a thousand years are adorned with the Bull of Thaurium, the Horses of Carthage and of Larissa, and the Hare of Messana.

"After a good deal of discussion we decided to allocate the designs for the Free State coinage as follows: "Upon the half-crown, the biggest and most valuable of the series, should be represented—the Irish hunter, that horse which is famous throughout the world. We decided that it should be represented riderless, in order that the artist should have the whole field of the coin in which to give the animal adequate treatment.

SALMON ON FLORIN

"As the florin closely approximates to the size of the half-crown and is sometimes confused with it we decided to make the two coins as different in design as possible by putting a salmon upon the florin. The salmon too, apart from the extraordinary beauty of its form, has an important place in Irish legend. "We decided to put a bull upon the shilling, to face in the opposite direction to the throne. The sixpence and threepenny-bit are commonly associated, and in our coinage are both struck in nickel, the only coins in which that metal is employed, so we endeavoured to emphasize their association by putting an Irish wolfhound on the sixpence and a hare on the threepenny-bit.

"To the penny we gave a hen and chickens. This we considered would be the coin most frequently used by the women of the house and by the children; and it seemed part of our duty to cater for their pleasure. Moreover, the size of the coin called for the representation of one of our most important national industries.

PIG IS REMEMBERED

"For the halfpenny, in the end we unanimously recommended the Minister to decide in favor of the pig, despite the unfair ridicule with which this noble and useful animal is often associated.

"Only the farthing remained. I think it was myself who, in the end suggested that it should bear a woodcock, a bird beloved by all true sportsmen—shy, scarce and elusive, like the farthing itself, and yet to be found in Ireland in larger numbers than elsewhere.

"Late in a dead waste and middle of the night, it occurred to me that we might have put upon the farthing as a design suited to its small value and serving also as a sop to those who had called for religious symbols, a brace of sparrows. "Know ye not that two sparrows are sold for a farthing. My doubt is stilled when I look at the exquisite woodcock which Mr. Metcalfe has designed for us. In the opinion of many good judges, it is the finest coin of the whole series.

"When we settled in this fashion the designs for the reverse of each coin, we decided, with little difficulty that the obverse of each coin must bear the Irish harp and the words 'Saorstát Eireann'.

Tender Accepted by Canadian Govt.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Dec. 21.—The tender of Messrs. Thorncroft Limited of Southampton, England, has been accepted by the government for the two new torpedo boat destroyers. The approximate cost of the two boats will be \$3,350,000. The order-in-council for the destroyers was passed today. They will replace the two Canadian destroyers, "Patriot" and "Patriote" which had been pronounced obsolete.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 21.—A feature of the local grain trade today was the good demand for American corn and sales of fifty cars and is sometimes confused with it we decided to make the two coins as different in design as possible by putting a salmon upon the florin. An active business was done in eggs and prices were firm. Receipts were 311 cases. Almost holiday quietness was reported in connection with the wholesale potatoes situation. A few sales were made as the trade has already stocked up for the holiday season. Prince Edward Island whites were offering at 75 cents and P. E. I. green mountains at 80 cents per 90 lbs. in bags. New Brunswick green mountains were offering at 60 cents per 90 lbs. in bulk. A moderate trade was passing in beans and peas. Canadian beans were selling at \$5.25 per bushel and choice bolting peas at \$3.50 per bushel, wholesale. There was no for their developments in the local butter situation, but the undertone remained strong and the general impression in the trade was that prices would reach a higher level before the close of the year if the present demand for supplies continued. Receipts were 94 packages. A feature of the cheese trade was the demand for matured cheese for export account and a sale of a fair sized lot of Western August made No. 1 colored was put through at 23 1-2 cents a pound. Apart from this the market was very quiet with Western fadder made No. 1 white and colored quoted at 18 cents to 18 1-4 cents per pound. Receipts were 581 boxes. ST. JOHN.—This egg market is weak today. Receipts are increasing and the stocks on hand are now more than sufficient for the local demand and as a result some small shipments are made to outside points. Prices to retailers are extras 65 to 68; firsts 56 to 60; seconds 48 cents. The demand for turkeys is active and prices are from 3 cents to 5 cts. below last year.

GOOD WINTER BUILDING PROGRAMME

New construction, including both buildings and engineering work, contracted for throughout all Canada during November shows an investment of \$29,039,200, according to MacLean building reports. Last month total was 4 per cent less than for November, 1927 and a 34.8 per cent decrease from October, this year. The November figure brought the total amount of new construction started in Canada since the first of the year up to \$453,127,400. This is an increase of 18.5 per cent over the same period of 1927 and an increase over the entire year of 1927 of 8 per cent. Work reported for the first time, or as contemplated, now amounts to \$56,315,500 as compared with \$61,437,300 for the first eleven months of last year. The greatest proportion of contracts awarded throughout Canada during November were in the worth of work having been contracted for. This was 39.2 per cent of all construction. Business buildings accounted for \$10,673,800 or 36.8 per cent. \$3,957,000 or the total for industrial undertakings or 13.6 per cent. Public works and utilities took \$4,042,000 or 13.9 per cent of its total of \$29,039,200.
