**Butter Fat System and Others.**

As the cheese-making season is now closed I wish to call the attention of cheese-makers and patrons of cheese factories to the system applied to the distribution of the proceeds from the sale of cheese. The Pooling or Weight System is going out, yet if the law, in regard to the adulteration of milk for factories, were not permitted to remain as a dead letter, it would be as fair and a much simpler plan than the Fat System which is now in general use.

While not minimizing the importance of milk rich in fat, we claim that in the manufacture of cheese, fat is not the only valuable material required. Cheese does not derive its commercial value from the fat alone, therefore it is an error to base the value of 100 lbs. of milk on the per cent of fat it contains. The fat system gives to the total quantity of fat, a value equal to the value of the total quantity of cheese. Now 100 lbs. cheese contains, approximately, 35 lbs. of fat and 65 lbs. of other material, not fat. Then, by accepting the fat system as correct, we accept as a truth, that in every 100 lbs. of cheese there are 65 lbs. of other material, not fat and not worth anything.

To show the result of the fat system in practice, we give the accounts of two patrons for the season of 1900. Brown supplied 50,000 lbs. of milk testing 4 per cent fat, Jones supplied 62,500 lbs. testing 3.2 per cent fat. Butter fat was worth 19 cents per lb. Brown and Jones each received \$380.00. What value do they give for the money? Each contribute 2000 lbs. of fat, but Jones supplies 12,500 lbs. more milk or 750 lbs. more Casien for which he does not receive any value. The fact is the principle is wrong. It gives aspurious value to a pound of fat, on this basis the distribution is made and the result is wrong.

The Fat Casien System calls for the addition of the quantity two to the per cent of fat. It is at least an honest effort to rectify the injustice of the Fat System, and that it has been adopted in some factories, shows that the error of that system is recognized in some sections. In practice it readily gives a measure of justice but not a full measure. The fact, that the quantity two is a fixed quantity and must be used in all factories and under all conditions, is one of its defects. The quantity two represents the basis of value of the material represented by the difference between the pounds of fat and the pounds of cheese, in the average sample of milk. Thus if the per cent of fat is four and the per cent of cheese 10, the quantity two represents the value of six lbs. of material, not fat. Such a theory could be evolved, only by giving a fixed value, to one pound of fat. Then when one pound of fat is worth 20 cents two might represent the value of the material, not fat. But if fat be worth 24 cents per lb. then two would not represent the value of the non-fat material.

We admit that the principle of adding to the per cent of fat is correct, but we claim that the quantity to add, at any factory, must depend on the averages or prevailing conditions at such factory. In conclusion we call the attention of all dairymen to the peculiarities of the case. None will be so bold as to uphold the fat system, then why not adopt the fat casien plan for the coming season, when the matter is carefully thought out, and the defects of the present methods, thoroughly understood, no doubt a better and more reasonable plan can be devised.
