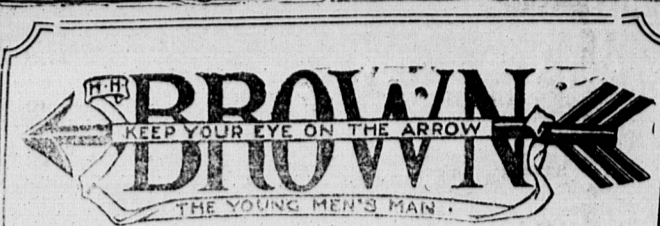

Continued from page 3. main until a sufficient number warrants a trip to market. At this time especially in the warm months of summer, the little germ is growing. At this stage every jar the egg receives causes deterioration, so that it is not hard to conclude the condition of the tastes and flavour of the egg when it reaches the consumer. The remedy for this, said Prof. Gilbert, is marketing only unfertilized eggs. Oh, but you say, how about hatching? Keep your breeders by themselves. Have a few of your most select specimens, the best layers of course, birds true to type and color and breed from them alone. This may incur a little extra trouble, but is it not the persevering merchant who succeeds? Again the feed the hen receives controls largely the flavor of the egg. No deteriorated animal or vegetable matter should be fed. The bird should not be allowed to scratch over the dung hill, as is so frequently done. Having taken all precautions as to the freshness and flavors of the egg, the next point is to put it on the market in an attractive manner. Already some localities find that they can only sell strictly guaranteed eggs—and it will come yet when every egg marketed will have to be guaranteed full value, if they are to be sold at all. Today, eggs sold in this manner command a price fifteen to twenty-five cents in excess of the regular price. The Professor cited different cases in actual experience that bore him out in stating this. It was no mere theory but backed up by hard plain facts. Get the article, get the superior article, and then you get your price. This is an age when the demand for pure food is rampant, and it will be had, even if at an advance in cost. The difference is deducted from the doctors bills every time. On being asked by Mr. Foster, if there was any way in which P. E. Island farmers could reach the markets paying 50c a dozen for eggs, Prof. Gilbert said "yes". "If the eggs can be positively guaranteed to be absolutely fresh," he mentioned the Poultry Producers' Protective Association of Eastern Canada, as being a body, easily formed, who would handle only such eggs. He stated that he would bring the matter to the notice of the secretary of the association, and suggested that a branch be formed in P. E. Island. He thought it a good matter for the P. E. Island Poultry Association to take up. Asked the best breed for the farmers to keep—any of the dual purpose fowls such as Rocks, Wyandotte, Orpingtons, or Reds, were suggested by him. By dual purposes is meant, birds that will produce two sources of profit, eggs and meat. He would not consider it profitable for the farmers' standpoint, to separate the two qualities. By careful trap-nesting and selection of the heavy breeds can be bred to lay as well as any of the Mediterranean family, at the same time having a good table bird. How many birds should the farmers keep? No more than can be given the proper amount of attention without neglecting any of the farm work. As to the care and feed of chickens, the first part or middle of May is sufficiently early to hatch—arrange to have the chickens grow with the grass. Care should not only be taken in feeding the chicks, but also the brood hen, before the eggs hatch. The next day, the 19th, 20th days if incubation the hen must be fed on the nest. During the first day and a half of the chicks life, no food should be given, this allows the digestive organs of the little chicks to adjust themselves and become stronger, the unabsorbed yolk of the egg sustaining life during this period. The first meals should be of dry stale bread crumbs. Later they may be soaked in milk squeezed dry and fed. About the fourth day boiled rice may be added. Positively no whole wheat should be fed till after at least the twelfth day, the little chickens can't digest it. The first six weeks is the critical period in the chicks life. By steadily increasing the rations till the bird is fed unstarvingly of a varied ration of fleshing foods—it is not beer, or muscle and fat that is wanted in market birds—a weight of show pounds can be had and has been, time and again, produced at show months. Asked as to double mating the professor said he did not favor the idea. Breed from birds of as even Barring as possible. Prof. Gilbert thanked his audience for the good attention they had given him.

On being asked to say a few words, H. E. Miller Secretary of the Poultry Association stated the disappointment felt by the management of the show just past that it was not better show than past by the farmers, in whose interest shows were being held. If possible another show will be held in the fall of 1910, and if it does not warrant the association continuing the shows can only be abandoned. Touching lightly on the conditions on the Island, one of the first points to be remedied is the housing of our birds—neither the houses that are an every sense of the word, "open air houses," open on four sides, nor the horticulturally sealed house is the proper style; the birds are better in the trees than in either of these styles. As to the improvement possible in the number of eggs produced, even a greater percentage of improvement is possible than mentioned by Prof. Gilbert, as, while the learned Professor set his figure at what he thought a very low mark, 100 eggs per hen per year, the last government census showed that our hens averaged only 80 eggs per hen per year—this easily allowing the production to be doubled without going beyond the average of other places. A hearty vote of thanks was moved by William Godfrey, seconded by John McFarlane and rendered by Prof. Gilbert and Mr. Miller by the President Mr. McDonald.
