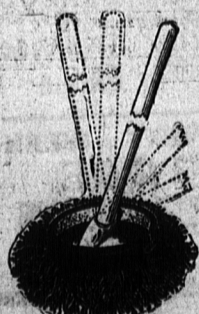

THE CAR FERRY.—The Prince Edward Island docked in Pictou yesterday shortly before noon with one hundred and sixty-two tons freight, three tons express, fifty sacks mail and one hundred and fifteen passengers.

VESSEL CITED.—The large three masted schooner, that for two months has been off from East Point to Red Point, the last week enclosed in a large body of ice not far from its edge, but apparently not frozen fast, as she was first heading west, but later was pointing towards the land. By a strong gale to New Glasgow, where she will likely drift by Cape North into the Atlantic with the ice which is generally inclined in that direction this time of year.

The death occurred at Afton Road Thursday, April 6th of Mr. Lawrence Steele an old respected citizen. The funeral took place on Saturday to St. Bonaventure's Church. After receiving the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church the remains were laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery. To those who are left to mourn, The Guardian extends sincere sympathy. SCH. WAPITI.—The Schooner Wapiti which has been high up on the sand in Egmont Bay, P. E. Island, since last July was in March jacked up and repaired, being damaged from going ashore very slightly, and successfully hauled on the ice fully a mile, the first week in April. The schooner was supported in cradles and on runners, in some respects almost equal to a ship's railway and now rests in the water sufficient to float her. This vessel having been built of oak, copper and galvanized fastenings was very heavy, weighing some hundred tons' dead weight. It may be considered a great feat, and credit is due Messrs Noy and Moore the contractors, and also Mr. McDougall of Port Hill who managed the Hydraulic work and Mr. Miller of Lot 16 who superintended the hauling. The Wapiti, one of the best coasters of her kind in the Maritime provinces, having large carrying capacity on light draft, was fully refitted and gone over eighteen months ago and is now a good sea going vessel for 20 years, will be sold as Capt. T. H. ## War Expenditure Near Million Dollar Per Day

OTTAWA, April 9.—The financial statement of the Dominion for the month of March and for the fiscal year ending with March (so far as the latter figures have yet been completed) by the finance department shows a war expenditure of no less than \$24,032,296 for last month; a total revenue of \$171,248,668 for the fiscal year and a national debt at the end of the year of \$555,027,582. The war expenditure is now getting pretty close to the million dollar a day mark; the revenue for the year was \$39,550,000 more than for the preceding year and a little over \$1,000,000 more than the Finance Minister estimated in his budget speech of Feb. 15th last; and he net debt shows an increase of \$147,000,000 during the twelve months. The war expenditure for the fiscal year is given as \$144,650,000, although the final figures will not be available for two or three months yet. Revenue increases as compared with the preceding twelve months were made up for the most part of \$22,480,000 in customs receipts, \$5,576,000 in post office receipts and \$1,000,000 in excise Expenditures on consolidated fund account decreased by about \$9,500,000 and capital expenditures by nearly \$3,500,000. Customs revenue for March totalled \$9,978,138 as compared with \$7,066,479 for March of last year.
