THE ARANMORE ASHORE.—The C. G. Aranmore, which left Charlottetown on Sunday morning last with supplies for the Strait of Belle Isle is ashore at White Island, Canadian Labrador. The C. G. S. Montcalm, has gone to her assistance from Port Hastings. Good hopes are entertained for getting the steamer off. Her bow rests in two fathoms of water and her stern in ten, and she is not taking in any water.

FOX MEETING.—A largely attended meeting in the interests of the fox industry was held in the High School Assembly Hall, Summerside last evening at which a number of prominent men identified with the industry spoke. Addresses were delivered by Mr. Pierce of A. and E. Pierce, Mr. Webster, President of the N. S. Steel, Chester Melure and others. The proposition before the meeting was to interest Island fox men in the Montreal Fur Sales Auction, guaranteed at \$5,000,000 and with the purpose of establishing a fur auction in Montreal. The Company has already purchased A. and E. Pierce, Holt Renfrew and Co., and other fur concerns. A resolution was passed by the meeting commending in the proposition re the establishment of the fur auction in Montreal.

Mr. T. H. Grady, Supt. of the Prince Edward Island Railway said the department is doing everything possible to improve transportation for the Island and gave some very encouraging statistics showing the extent to which the volume of trade on the Island has increased.

Capt. Wynip related his experience in his trip from Port William to Charlottetown.

Hon. Cyrus W. Crosby, C. P. W. spoke of the value of good roads to the country and city. What is needed is some one to evolve a scheme whereby the necessary funds can be secured for the purpose.

Mr. P. F. Ross spoke of some of the difficulties the packing business had to contend with, which included the irregularity of the supply of stock and material. He said that he believed the future of Prince Edward Island lies in agriculture and in the manufacture of lines co-related to agriculture. Industrial Night (Continued from Page One.) Mr. W. K. Rogers dwelt on the importance and growth of our fur industry pointing out that last year pelts to the value of a million dollars were sold. Fox farming which originated on the Island is now spreading over the northern part of the United States and other parts of Canada. Why should not more fur farming be carried on here? He announced amid applause that he had closed a contract for the delivery of 15,000 worth of live foxes. The fox business should be brought more to the attention of our farmers and he also referred to the movement now on foot to establish a great fur sales auction market in Canada in order that the Canadian furs could be marketed here and the money which now goes in commissions to American houses might be saved to Canada. He said that at the fur auction sales in St. Louis last year, pelts to the value of \$15,000,000 were sold. He believed that of these pelts 75 per cent came from Canada. There were buyers from Paris; Petrograd and London. The musical program was heartily enjoyed and some excellent Rotary songs were sung by the Rotary choir under the direction of Rotarian Yeo, throughout the evening. A duet by Rotarian Calder and Mr. Roy Quigley gave particular pleasure. Miss Lillian Earle was accompanist for the evening.
