CROWN PRINCE HELD IN FRENCH RING OF FORTS NEAR VERDUN

VERDUN, France, Jan. 20.—With indefatigable energy, the French troops have so strengthened their positions in the Verdun district that to-day it appears to be almost an impossibility for the Germans either to retreat or advance.

On every hand it is to be seen the work of the French in strengthening and improving the position, anticipating an attack from the Germans. The Territorials are being organized. The mud is being removed from the roads, and approaches to the battle line are being placed in better condition.

Eatente Allies Handling Greece Without Glove

BERLIN, January 18.—(By wireless to Saville.)—A note to the Greek government, amounting to an ultimatum, is said by the Overseas news agency to have been presented to France and Great Britain.

LONDON, January 18.—Berlin dispatches of yesterday, which have not been corroborated from French or British sources, stated that unusual measures were taken by the allies in Greece.

SIR PERCY LAKE NOW IN SUPREME COMMAND. LONDON, January 21.—J. Austen Chamberlain announced in the House yesterday that Lieut. General Sir Percy Lake yesterday took over the supreme command of the Mesopotamia expedition from General Sir John Eccles Dixon, who has been invalided home.

THE BRITISH AND GERMAN AERIAL FORCES

LONDON, Jan. 22.—The assertion made by a section of the British press that the German aerial service recently has been perfected to such a point as to surpass that of the British, is not endorsed by Harold J. Tennant, parliamentary under-secretary for war who was questioned on this subject yesterday afternoon in the House of Commons.

The German method of fighting in the air, Mr. Tennant continued, is of a defensive nature. The new Fokker monoplane which have been described in the press as superior to those of the allies, are well adapted for defensive work, the under-secretary explained, but are incapable of making long flights.
