Prospects For Greater Export Of Gypsum

Plaster board is coming into greater favor in the building industry in Great Britain, it being credited with overcoming to a great extent the prejudice which lingered in the minds of some builders against wallboard in general, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. In addition to plaster board of English manufacture is a Canadian product. Due to the increasing demand from the English plaster board industry large quantities of gypsum have been imported from Canada. There are extensive deposits of gypsum in Canada, in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The English plaster board industry seems likely to retain its strong position which should result in increased imports of Canadian gypsum. There are deposits of high grade gypsum rock in Cumberland and Derbyshire, in England, but it is not known to what extent these sources of supply can continue to satisfy the increasing demands of

the English plaster board industry. Fibre board is also coming into greater favor in Great Britain for many jobs in building construction as well as other trades in which it is alone suited. Canada is represented in the English market with fibre board also. The English fibre board is of the heavy cardboard type made chiefly from waste material.

OLD CRADLES RELICS OF PIONEER FARMERS

FORT ST. JAMES, B.C., Oct. 24.—Relics of the days when pioneer settlers penetrated into the wild brush country of northern British Columbia 75 years ago, a number of cradles, primitive grain-cutting implements, have been found in one of the Hudson's Bay company's old log warehouses here.

The cradles, a form of scythe with a row of teeth projecting above and parallel to the blade to lay the swathes of grain in straight rows, are believed to have been brought into the warehouse shortly after it was erected about 1872.

Once in great demand, the cradles have lain unused and rusting more than 40 years.

SOUTH AFRICA USES STEEL RAILWAY TIES

South Africa has gone in for steel railway ties on a large scale which are obtained from European countries, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. In the case of wood ties, hardwood is preferred. The railway authorities of South Africa estimate the life of steel ties at thirty years, hardwood 20 years and treated softwood ties 14 years. South Africa is troubled with wood-boring insects, particularly the termite, and this is a factor. There is only one timber crescenting plant in South Africa, at Mossel Bay.

Chewing Gum From Carbide

Chewing gum from carbide and a possible substitute for shatter-proof glass is some of the magic which Canadian chemists daily are performing. In addition, from this same product beautifully colored brushes and combs, cups and various decorative containers are turned out. Great resources of hydro-electric energy have helped to bring about this state of affairs and Canada's chemical industry has grown to such an extent that it is way up among chemical producing countries of the world, states the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. The magic chemistry has changed what formerly gave rise to some international lawsuits into a valuable by-product. In days gone by the stacks of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company at Trail, B. C. belched forth huge volumes of sulphurous smoke which menaced vegetation in the surrounding country and scattered its noxiousness over the International boundary out of which many lawsuits ensued. Chemists now take this smoke and turn it into sulphuric acid from which fertilizers and many other valuable products are produced.

C. N. R. REVENUES MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 24.—The gross revenues of the all inclusive Canadian National Railway System for the week ending October 14, 1934, were \$3,232,378, as compared with \$3,107,950, for the corresponding period of 1933, an increase of \$124,428.

World's Unused Shipping Tonnage Is Declining

The world's merchant shipping has fallen off from the high 1931 of 70,000,000 tons to 65,000,000 tons but is above the 1914 tonnage by 16,000,000 tons. There is, however, a growing reduction in the amount of unemployed tonnage, this having dropped from 15,000,000 tons two years ago to 8,000,000 tons at the present time according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Many of the ships laid up are uneconomical in operation under existing conditions. Shipping, however, has experienced several periods of acute depression but these all eventually passed and were succeeded by years of greater activity and prosperity. This fact is brought to attention by the report of Lloyd's Register which this year is celebrating its centenary and it is giving shipowners hope that there will be a reasonable measure of prosperity within the near future. There is an increase in shipbuilding activity which would indicate that the returning tide of prosperity has set in. Obsolete vessels are being broken up. For the year ending June 30th last 63 vessels have gone under the shipbreaker's hammer, totalling 2,064,025 tons. Since that date 48 additional vessels have been broken up or undergoing process of being broken up and 135 vessels have been sold for breaking. Since June, 1933, 2,700,000 tons of shipping have been scrapped or sold for that purpose.

Speed Age Changing Breed Of Horse

Ontario draft horses are making their appearance in the north of England area which includes Liverpool and Manchester. An experimental shipment of Clydesdale horses from Ontario to the Liverpool area last spring has been successful and it is hoped will lead to a steady and profitable trade, according to the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railways. The topography of cities has a great deal to do with the type of horse required. For instance Liverpool requires a sturdy type of animal for dock work and drawing heavy loads up grades, while Manchester, where the ground is more level, likes a lighter horse. The legs of the Ontario Clydesdales came in for favorable comment. In the matter of color the dark hues are preferred while sometimes dapple gray will add to a horse's value. The modern age of speed has even hit the horse breeding industry, a horse that is smarter on his feet and quicker in his movements than the shire type of horse, which only recently held first place in the estimation of buyers, being desirable. Horse breeders in the southern part of England are setting out to breed that type of horse, preserving as far as possible the strong body and great girth of the shire but having lighter legs and capable of quicker movement. Home bred horses are selling in the neighborhood of Liverpool, Manchester and Chester all the way from 300.00 to \$375.00 and some fetch as high as \$450.00.

Indications point to a permanent growing market in the Orient for potato starch due to the migration of the textile industry to the Far East.
