

addition to his retiring practice,
Dr. Cosgrove can be credited for
skillfully treating, through charity,
several human cases at Well-
ington. For instance, he set and
dressed a woman's leg, accidently
broken at Wellington, which dress-
ing was pronounced perfect by the
doctor at the hospital, and was not
removed. The doctor is taking a
pleasure trip, and is going to spend
a while with his son-in-law, Dr.
Delaney, Chatham, N. B., and with
his son-in-law Dr. Condrick in Bos-
ton, and with his three sons in
Maine. The two Miss Fitzsim-
ons are entering Brocton Hospi-
tal, Boston, to train for nurses.—

IN MEMORIAM

MR. SIMON BLONDON

On the evening of Oct. 29, 1923,
death's shadow again cast a gloom
over Glen Valley, when it was
learned with deep regret that Sim-
on Blondon had passed away. The
deceased was in fairly good health
until recently when he was strik-
en on Saturday and sank gradually
the end coming calmly and peace-
fully in the presence of his family.
Mr. Blondon was a man highly es-
teemed for his truth and honesty.
His word was his bond. The fun-
eral services at the house and grave
were conducted by the Rev. R. H.
Stavert, pastor of the Hartsville
Presbyterian church. There are
left to mourn his wife, his son S.
A., at home, one son William in
New Mexico, John of Montana, two
daughters, Mrs. John Matheson of
Edmonton, Alberta and Mrs. Elize-
beth Croning of Edmonton, Alber-
ta. His remains were laid to rest
in Hartsville besides his daughter
who predeceased thirty years ago.

DR. J. W. WADMAN

Word was received in Char-
lottetown yesterday of the death in
San Francisco of Rev. Dr. J. W.
Wadman, brother of Mrs. Peter
Newsome. Dr. Wadman was one of
the outstanding figures in the
Methodist Church, being one time
pastor of Grace Church in Char-
lottetown and subsequently a dis-
tinguished missionary in Japan.
Dr. Wadman began his life's
work as a Minister of the Metho-
dist Church in the Conference of
New Brunswick and P. E. Island.
In 1883-4 he was stationed in Char-
lottetown in association with the
Rev. John Burwash when the First
and Second Methodist Churches
were under one board of manage-
ment.
Thirty-three years ago Dr. Wad-
man went to Japan where for fif-
teen years he laboured with much

success. During the past eighteen
years he had been in Hawaii
where in connection with his mis-
sionary work he succeeded in hav-
ing a prohibitory law passed by a
special act of Congress which
made the entire island of Hawaii
absolutely bone dry.
The late Mr. Wadman visited
the Island last summer. He was
thirty-three years in Missionary
work in Japan.

ANNIE JANE COOK

It is with deep regret that we
learn of the death of Annie Jane
Cook on Nov. 30. She was the wife
of the late Capt. John K. Pidgeon
and was born in Liverpool Eng-
land in 1836. She was mar-
ried to Capt. John K. Pidgeon of

ted wife and during her husband's
three years illness ministered to
his needs as only a loving wife
can. At his death she was left a
widow with five small children all
of whom are still living. She was
loved and respected by all who
