HEALTH LEAGUE OF CANADA

C. N. R. CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER LAURENCE V. D. PROGRAM

MONTREAL, Que. — Activity of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in the drive against venereal disease has been applauded by Dr. K. E. Dowd, the chief medical officer of the Canadian National Railways.
