LOCAL BRIEFS

MR. R. ROBERTS shipped 35 head of cattle yesterday by the Bonavista, three of which he fed himself which weighed nearly 5000 lbs.

MR. GEORGE W. HYNDMAN, youngest son of Mr. Fred W. Hyndman, leaves this morning for Montreal to take up a position on the staff of the Bank of Montreal to which he has been appointed.

MR. FRED ROBERTS shipped yesterday by the Bonavista a fine herd of cattle, for three of which he paid the nice sum of \$160. Among the number was a steer and cow for which he paid \$100. Messrs. Roberts are buying largely this season and are receiving the confidence of the farmers in general.

THE Misses Butler, who, for nearly a year have been ably assisting in the First Methodist Church choir, left last night by the S. S. Campana on return to Montreal. They were waited upon on Saturday by a deputation from the choir and each presented with a small token and an address as an acknowledgement of the assistance rendered by them.

EASTERN NOTES.—Continued dry weather, and the certainty of poor hay and pasture is the outlook for the farmer at present. The cropping is nearly done, and day after day the farmer looks at the clouds to see if there is any prospect of the rain so essential to every subsistence but so far this spring he has looked in vain.—Cod-fishing is poor, in fact may be put down as a failure. The usual school of fish don't appear to have come into the Gulf, as there is no body of fish either on the north or south side of the Point. Probably a fleet of trawlers at Cape North has intercepted and broken the school on its way in.—The factories at East Point are doing well at lobster fishing.—A gloom was cast over the country here on the 20th inst by the arrival of the body of Minnie Ching from Natick Mass. where she had died of measles on the 23rd inst, and much sympathy is felt for her sorrowing friends. The third daughter of John Ching of Red Point, kind and affable in her nature, a general favorite with all, she passed away in the early bloom of a promising and vigorous womanhood sincerely regretted by her numerous acquaintances. All that tender care and loving attention could do for her was done by her Aunt Miss Martha Stewart during her illness, who with Edmund Baker accompanied the remains to the Island. On the 27th her remains were conveyed to the South Lake cemetery, the large body present attesting to her popularity in the neighborhood.

OBITUARY.—The death of Deacon Wm. Ward, of Kingston, which occurred May 18, after a lingering and painful illness, was the occasion of a very general expression of that true human sympathy, which is the best element in our nature, and which never fails to become prominent in a time of affliction. Brother Ward was a Deacon and Superintendent of the Sunday School in the Kingston Branch of the North River Baptist Church. He was also chaplain of King William Lodge, 1166, Loyal Orange Association. His funeral on Sunday May 21, was very largely attended, over 100 carriages being in line and some 350 walking to the grave, including about one hundred Orangemen representing six different lodges. The were conducted by Rev. A. F. Brown, assisted by Rev. G. F. Dobson, and were of a very solemn character. At the grave after prayer by pastor Brown, the impressive and beautiful Orange burial service was conducted by Grand Master Murdoch McLeod. On Sunday evening May 28, Mr. Brown preached a memorial sermon on the death of Mr. Ward, in the Kingston Baptist Society, to a congregation that over taxed the seating capacity of the edifice, from the words of 2nd Timothy 4. 7. "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." In every walk of public and private life, Bro. Ward was a faithful and consistent representative of the blessed Master, whose reward for true service did not fail him in his last illness, during which he frequently exclaimed, "I long to meet my Redeemer." He leaves a widow five sons and two daughters. Their loss and our loss, is a gain to the Land of Rest "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord"

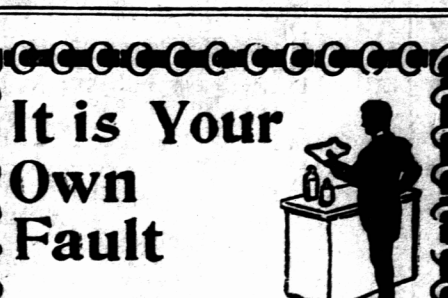
