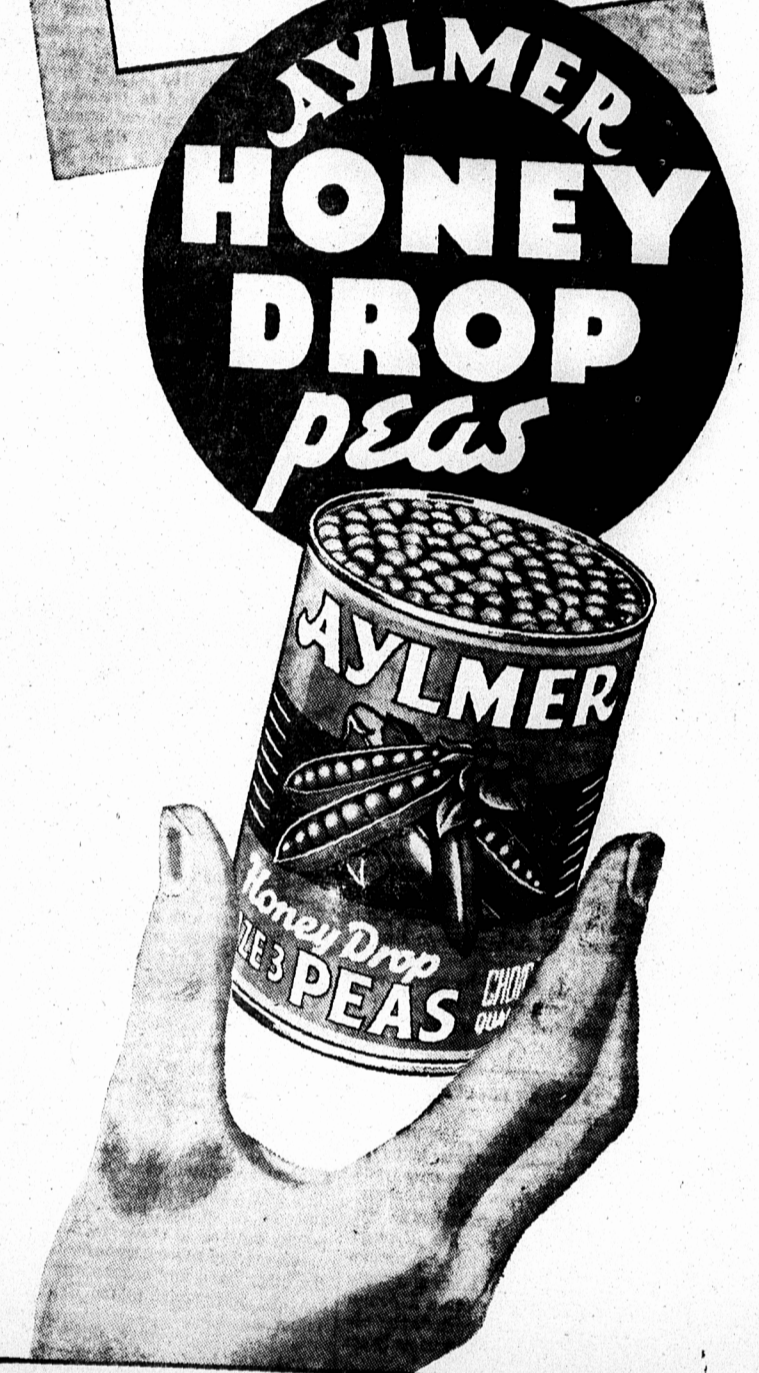

Health Officer's Report

No communicable diseases were reported in the City of Charlottetown during the month of September, the health report prepared by Dr. Keeping revealed at the monthly meeting of the Charlottetown City Council Tuesday night. 60 chest examinations were made during the month.

Laboratory examinations: Water 25; sputa, 48; urinalysis, 4; smears for G.C. 2; bloods for widal, 9; bloods for B. abortus, 2; stools for typhoid, 3; throat swabs, 1; bloods for Kahn, 83; milk for B.P. and sed., 32; bacterial count, 32; cream for B.P., 5.

Veneral disease report: patients treated, males, 23; females, 4; total 27. New cases reported: males, 9; females, 1; total 10. Total number of treatments given during month, 121.

Home nursing report: 2217 pupils examined in rapid school surveys, 3 excluded; 16 home visits made; 4 well baby conferences held; 282 P.W.C. & St. Dunstan's students examined; 35 vaccinated against smallpox.

SANITARY OFFICER'S REPORT

Duties performed by the Sanitary Officer James E. Bradley were listed as follows. Restaurants inspected, 11; yards inspected, 355; privies inspected, 137; stables inspected, 16; manure boxes inspected, 14; slaughter houses inspected, 4; pig-sties inspected, 8; lavatories inspected, 15; nuisances removed from streets, 3.

The dump managed by the Hygiene Service Company was inspected on October 6th. It found the dump better cared for than it was on my previous report, the incinerator being in use burning paper. The Sanitary Officer said. Other duties performed included—summons served, 14; prosecutions on non payment of dog tax, 5; dog tax collected, \$72.00.
