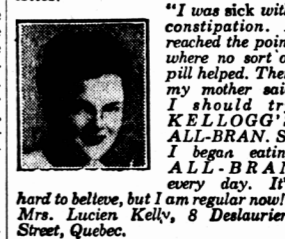
"JIGGS, MAGGIE IN COURT" TO OPEN
