MONTREAL STRIKE IS MORE SERIOUS

Stoppage of the Street Railway Threatened

The Doukhobors Still Making Trouble for the Government—Stratton Denies the Story Told by Gamey.

STRATTON CONTRADICTS GAMEY. TORONTO, May 4.—(Special)—Hon. J. R. Stratton testified in Gamey's inquiry to-day and denied all the statements made by the member for Manitoulin.

THE TROUBLESOME DOUKHOBORS. BOPADANO, North Saskatchewan, May 4.—(Special)—The Immigration Agent burst into large meetings consisting of several hundred delegates from four Doukhobor villages. Three delegates from Yorkton were endeavoring to make an uprising at one meeting which was attended by men and women in a nude state. The agent ordered the meetings to disperse and forced the leaders from Yorkton to return.

THE STRIKE CONTINUES. MONTREAL, May 4.—(Special)—All the attempts to settle the longshoremen's strike have failed. Members of heavy teamsters and cartmen's union struck this morning. The striking longshoremen refused the offer of the ship owners who will grant every concession demanded save the recognition of the union. MORE MEN TO GO ON STRIKE. The electrical workers refused to fix lights on the docks and it is believed here they will strike tonight. It is also said the Montreal street railway men will go on strike for a recognition of their union.

KLONDYKE'S MOST DISASTROUS FLOOD

Sweeping Down Bonanza Creek Inundating Valley

Loss in the Millions—The Inhabitants are Moving Away—Negroes Dynamite a Church Blowing Large Hole in the Wall.

KLONDYKE'S GREAT FLOOD. TACOMA, Wash May 4.—(Special)—The most destructive flood in the history of the Klondyke sweeping down Bonanza creek flooding the cuts and inundating the road and the houses along the way, 11 GREAT DAMAGE DONE.

The water is creeping into the piles of dry dirt, heaped up from winter's work and spreading devastation for many miles around. Expensive machinery and equipment have been destroyed and the injury to sluices will reach to a big sum.

INHABITANTS MOVING. Main Street, Grand Forks is under water and the inhabitants are peering to move to higher ground.

TREMEINDEOUS LOSSES. The dumps containing an aggregate of \$2,000,000 piled on the ice have been undermined and washed away. Recovery is practically impossible. Great excitement prevails.

WAR AMONG NEGRO CHURCHES. CHICAGO, May 4.—(Special)—The war which the negro preachers have been waging on "Polley" culminated in an attempt to dynamite the institutional church last night. The explosion broke all the windows and blew a large hole in the south wall. The shock was felt several blocks away. The pastor is leading the anti-polley crusade.

THE KING SAYS ADIEU TO PARIS

Amid the Cheering of the French Populace

The Bands Play the National Anthem and King Edward and President Loubet Hold Long Farewell Conversation.

SUSPICIOUS CHARACTERS ARRESTED. PARIS, April 4.—(Special)—At the moment when President Loubet was leaving the British Embassy after the reception following the dinner to King Edward the police arrested three suspicious characters.

This gave rise to rumors of assassination in London. The King left for Cherbourg to-day amid the booming of hundreds of cannon and the acclamations of enormous crowds.

ELABORATE CEREMONIES. The ceremonies were on the same elaborate and spectacular scale as on his arrival. President Loubet drove with the King through avenues on both sides of troops and large crowds massed.

His Majesty wore the uniform of the British Admiral. In the carriage following were Premier Combes and foreign ministers of Delcasse.

The station was sumptuously decorated with crimson and gold hangings and British and French colors.

THE NATIONAL ANTHEM.

The Band played God Save the King. The final adieus were extremely cordial, the King and the President holding long and intimate farewell conversation. The King saluted the officers, bowed and smiled to the cheering crowd.

They entered the train and departed for Cherbourg where the French squadron is waiting to render him farewell honors.

CHARLOTTETOWN'S BARGAIN HUNTERS

Are Revelling in Big Sale of Sentner, McLeod & Co's

The Store Crowded and at Times Doors Have to be Shut to Lessen the Big Crush.

FIVE years ago on July 12th next the present firm of Sentner, McLeod & Co., composed of L. C. Sentner, Daniel McLeod and R. C. McLeod, Summerside, purchased the large dry goods business conducted previously by Beer Bros on Queen Street.

Through the business at the time of the purchase was a large one it had increased greatly under the new firm till to-day it is 50% larger than when it was taken over by Sentner, McLeod & Co. On July 12 next the partnership made for five years expires, thus necessitating a change in the business and also the great slaughter sale that is now in progress.

The fact that the change had not been decided on till after all the spring goods were purchased accounts for the completeness of the stock and gives the purchasers a far greater range than otherwise.

The slaughter sale commenced on Friday last, May 1. Ever since the throng has been so great that it has been necessary to close the doors during the day and evening on account of the crush and at almost every part of the day the clothing and the dry goods store have been packed to the doors.

Six extra hands have been added to the large staff in order to meet the increasing sales and a number more of experienced clerks are also wanted.

It has also been decided to keep the clothing department open during the evening in order that the working man may share in the bargains.

The stock is almost all new and the immense crowds show that the bargains have perhaps never been so excellent here. The sale is for cash only and the books are closed. It will be continued until the new stock is sold. The sale will be at least three days that time will be at least a distant date.

A STRIKE ORDERED.

LYNN, Mass., May 1.—Building Laborers Union No. 4 last night voted to order a general strike of the trades on some 15 firms of building contractors who have not ratified their acceptance of the new wage schedule of \$2.75 per day for masonry mixers and \$2.50 per day for hot carriers. Five firms have signed the schedule.
