Sword 1,100 Years Old

LONDON, July 21.—Sir Owen Seaman, trustee of Stowe School, Buckinghamshire, has presented to the school an ancient Samurai sword.

This sword, which was made over 1,100 years ago, was long held in honor in the famous Temple of Usa, in Japan. It was presented to the Agenda Club on its foundation in 1910 by the Japanese Ambassador.

There are only two swords like it in the world. It was presented to the Agenda Club because the Japanese Ambassador felt that the ideal of the club—to unite English gentlemen in the service of England—had much in common with the Samurai of Japan.

Building By-Laws

BY-LAW pertaining to the erection of buildings of manufacturing Lobster, Fruit, Poultry and Meat canneries, Slaughter Houses, Tanneries, etc.

Be it enacted that we, the Town Council of the Town of Borden will grant permits and give consent to any person whom we consider competent to erect plant and machinery on any or all of the above mentioned industries and further that if any or all of the above mentioned be found by a majority of the Council or by our Board of Health to be a public nuisance, or of a nature injurious to the health of the residents of the Town or Borden or of the safeguarding of property in the said Town, that the Council have the power after 30 days' notice to close down any such place, and to keep it closed until such place has been proved to the satisfaction of the Council of the Town of Borden, to be run in a sanitary and safe manner and that a fine of TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$200) be imposed on any packer or manufacturer who, after being notified still persists in the pursuit of such business detrimental to the public health or interests of the residents of the Town of Borden.

Large Meeting at North Wiltshire

The joint political meeting at North Wiltshire on Friday night was largely attended. Mr. Edison Easter occupied the chair. The speakers in the order named were Messrs: J. H. Buntain, B. W. LePage, L. L. Jenkins and George E. Hughes. All the speakers received a good hearing. Mr. Buntain was given a splendid reception and his criticism of the Bell Government was well received and generously applauded.

Mr. LePage followed but was evidently in bad humor and talked very rapidly. He paid a good deal of attention to the alleged \$253,000 deficit but did not appear to have understood that since the challenge issued to produce a similar statement for 1922 that the party generally were avoiding this subject. He placed a considerable value on his own services to the district, a sentiment which the audience did not reciprocate to any considerable extent. He cut down and modified applause for a once Liberal stronghold.

Mr. Jenkins was given an excellent hearing and the audience showed their appreciation of the castigation he gave Mr. LePage. He again challenged Mr. LePage to produce a statement for Sept. 1922 and also asked Mr. Hughes why, when getting another statement from the Provincial Auditor, he did not get this one which had been asked for at several previous meetings.

Neither Mr. LePage nor Mr. Hughes made any reply. He took up the Highways project at North Wiltshire demanding which of three alternatives the new road was to take but on this he could get no information, although the people in the neighborhood strongly demanded to know it. Mr. Jenkins also referred to the Income Tax which the Liberals boasted they had placed on a sliding scale so as to compel the wealthy to pay proportionately to their wealth. He took up the sliding scale was a slide up in the case of Conservatives and a slide down in that of the Liberals. Although there are very wealthy men in the North Wiltshire school district there was only \$84 income tax collected from them all.

Mr. George Wheatley asked for a few minutes to relate some statements made by Mr. Hughes and Mr. LePage but an organized gang refused to hear him and the meeting broke up in disorder.

Patient's Own Blood Injected In Veins

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 21.—Complete success was today reported at the New Haven General Hospital in two unusual cases of blood transfusion into the patients' own veins. Both the lives and the blood of the patients were saved by the operations. The experiments were conducted under the direction of Professors of the Yale Medical School, which controls the hospital, and the reports which will be made in medical journals are expected to surprise the scientific world.
