her able exco'tors, as well as to all the members of the Aid, the Trustees tender their hearty congratulations. While the amount raised was a big increase over the receipts of any previous year, still it is only a small part of what can be raised by proper organized effort. Hospital work is woman's work. Women all are extremely concerned in the welfare of the Prince Edward Island Hospital and in every school district, there should be a branch organized of the Ladies' Aid. It should not be difficult to raise at least \$15,000.00 per year, if the two counties were properly organized. And we can assure the ladies the money is needed to keep the hospital equipped and abreast of the times.

The ladies as usual took charge of the envelope collection for the city and carried the work through most successfully. In order that every assistance possible be given to our medical staff and to the public, we are installing a first class and thoroughly equipped laboratory and Dr. Carruthers and Dr. Alley are now taking complete courses in laboratory work.

Once more, we have to give great credit to Miss Louise McKinnon, the Lady Superintendent. Notwithstanding the great increase in the amount of work and consequent increased responsibility, everything has gone on without any trouble or complaint from anyone.

During this year, we lost the services of Mrs. Inglis, who had most capably filled for some time the position of housekeeper. She was succeeded by Miss Edith Love who also filled the position to the satisfaction of the management, but she also resigned and this position is at present unfilled. Miss Annie McKinnon, who has for three years so well filled the position of Surgical Nurse, has resigned in order to be married. Her position has been filled by the appointment of Miss Ora Borthwick Proffitt, one of our own graduates. We cannot too strongly express our appreciation of the work of all the nurses. If it will make their hard work seem lighter or their life brighter, we can tell them that for some reason, we have never had so many kind words said about their good work as in the year just closed. Many patients have spoken to trustees most kindly and enthusiastically about the treatment they have received from the nurses.

Butter Market

Closed Strong

MONTREAL, May 31.—The receipts of butter for the week ending May 28, 1921, were 15,104 packages which shows an increase of 2,259 packages as compared with the previous week and an increase of 5,996 packages with the same week last year. While total receipts since May 1, 1921, to date shows an increase of 14,978 packages with the corresponding period in 1920.

Although supplies of butter during the past week were much larger than the previous one and the same week last year, a stronger feeling prevailed in the situation and prices scored an advance of 2c to 2 3/8c per lb as compared with the closing figures of a week ago. This was attributed to the increased demand from English importers for supplies of finest Canadian creamery and as the prices bid were satisfactory further business resulted. Another strengthening factor was the keener demand from local buyers for the offerings of finest grades to meet immediate and future requirements.

and on the whole a fairly active trade was done.

At the auction sales held here last week there were 2,112 packages offered as against 2,438 packages for the previous week, 2,680 packages for the same week last year. Pasteurized creamery sold at 28 7/8c and 29 3/4c per lb, finest creamery at 25 1/2c and 29 1/4c and fine at 27 5/8c and 28 3/4c, as compared with 54c, 55c, and 52c respectively for the closing figures for the same week last year, showing a decline of 23 1/2c, 23 3/4c, and 24 1/4c per lb. In the early part of the week prices in the country were stronger, all the offerings at Isle Verte selling at 26 1/8 per lb, f. o. b., and at St. Paschal at 27 1/2c.

Local wholesale prices for round lots were quoted as follows: Pasteurized creamery, 29 3/4c to 30c; Fine creamery, 29 1/4c to 29 1/2c; Fine creamery, 28 1/2c to 28 3/4c. The receipts of cheese for the week ending May 28, 1921, were 40,290 boxes, which show an increase of 6,423 boxes as compared with the previous week and an increase of 5,560 boxes with the same week last year, while the total receipts since May 1, 1921, to date show an increase of 32,109 boxes with the same period last year.

The course of prices for cheese at the boards throughout the country last week was somewhat irregular, and especially so for colored goods, as advances in some cases were recorded at 3-16c to 3-8c per lb., and others of 1-16c to 1-12c per lb., while in other instances declines were made ranging from 5-8 to 3-4c per lb. as compared with the previous week, but the market for white cheese was strong on account of the continued temporary scarcity and good premiums were paid for these goods over colored, the highest prices realized for No. 1 white being 17-1/4c per lb., at the auction sale held here, while at the boards in the country 16-1/4c to 16-6/16c, 16-5/8c and 14-13/16c to 16-1/8c, with the bulk of the purchases at from 15-1/8c to 15-3/4c. On the whole the feeling has been somewhat unsettled owing to the weakness in the market for steril-

ing exchange, but notwithstanding this fact a good steady business has been done for export account, which indicates that our goods are wanted in the English markets at the present level of prices. On spot finest western colored is quoted at 16-1/4c to 16-1/2c per lb. and finest eastern at 16c.

COUNTRY DAIRY BOARD

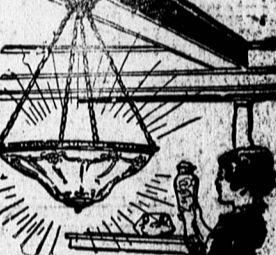
FARNHAM, May 28.—At the meeting of the Eastern Townships Dairymen's Exchange today fourteen factories offered 916 packages creamery butter, for which the competition between buyers was keen, and prices scored an advance of 3-1/8c to 3-1/4c per lb. over a week ago. Two factories sold at 30-1/4c per lb., f. o. b., eight at 30-1/8c and three at 30c. At this date a year ago 630 packages were offered and sold at 54-3/8c to 64-1/2c per lb., f. o. b., consequently prices today are 24-1/8c to 24-1/2c per lb. lower.

ST. HYACINTHE, May 28.—The offerings on the board today were 100 packages creamery butter and 150 boxes of cheese. The butter sold at 28-3/4c per lb., f. o. b., which is an advance of 2-1/4c per lb. as compared with a week ago and a decline of 23-3/4c per lb. with a year ago, when 135 packages aged sold at 52-1/2c per lb.
