Teams Battle To Draw In Another Gruelling Game

In a grueling, bitterly-fought struggle that for thrilling and nerve-racking moments surpassed anything offered in their two previous games, West Kent and Queen Square yesterday battled to a 6-6 draw making a fourth game necessary before this year's inter-scholastic champions are decided. Rivalry modern stage was reached as the teams put on a show yesterday that furnished thrills at a dime a dozen. Beaten back and scored upon twice in the opening session by the smashing attacks of the Queen Square team the defending champions were in a tough spot as they left the field trailing 6-0, the result of Tom Doyle's unconverted try and a penalty placement by Pursor. But the yellow and blue clad team showed their mettle. Tearing loose with a withering assault from the start of the second half the West Kenters ran the score to 6-6 within five minutes; Doug Saunders booted a penalty kick between the posts from forty yards out on the second play and then Archer crossed the line in the corner on a half line play three minutes later. Sensing victory the West Kenters kept the play on the Queen Square five yard line for the next five minutes but the stout-hearted challengers recovering their form repulsed their opponents on every play and finally eased the tension by dribbling the ball back into the hands of the Queen Square team. Even all the way with the play shifting from end to end with amazing rapidity. Outrushing, outkicking and outmanoeuvring their opponents the Queen Square team had all the better of the play during the first half. Right from the opening minutes they carried the play inside the 15-yard line and three times within a like number of minutes W. K. S. were forced to touch for safety. Ernie Howatt's deadly kicking was the big feature of his team's attack and it was the divine kicking quarter that paved the way for the opening try. From a lineout at centre field Howatt booted down the field; Hank Hennessey following fast kicked the ball over the line as the West Kent fullback fumbled and in a mad rush for the loose oval Tom Dickson tried for the try. Pursor's attempt to convert was inches short of the posts.

On top of every play the Q. S. & forwards gave the West Kent team little chance to get started and costly fumbles kept the West Kent team continually on the defensive. However they dribbled

No Decision Reached Re Olympic Team

HALIFAX, Nov. 21—Selection of a hockey team to represent Canada in the 1936 Olympic Games was still problem tonight. Officials of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association had spent two days with P. J. Mulqueen, Chairman of the Canadian Olympic Committee, in an effort to decide what to do about the break-up of Halifax Wolverines, 1935 Allan Cup holders, but no announcement was made when they adjourned until tomorrow.

President W. A. Fry of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada told a commercial club here today that efforts were being made to restore the line-up of Wolverines. Hockey officials said he had spoken out of turn, however, and President E. A. Gilroy of the C. A. H. issued this statement tonight: "The statement made by W. A. Fry, President of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, today that the Halifax Wolverines would represent Canada in the Olympic Games is just a little premature, as a definite decision on this question has not as yet been arrived at. When any decision is reached, same will be given to the press by the President of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, the only body authorized to do so."

Two members of the championship team, Ron Hudson and Owen Lennon, are beyond recall in the professional ranks, and Mickey MacGlashen, Frankie Graham and Frankie Lavigne, now in Sudbury, Ont., are eligible for the Olympics. The trio followed Coach Red Stuart to Ontario because they could not afford to pass up the permanent jobs offered there, they said on leaving the Wolverines.

If the Wolverines are not brought up to the strength required for the series overseas, the C. A. H. may call upon Port Arthur Bearcats, runners-up in the Allan Cup series, or arrange a play-off series between Bearcats and Montreal Royals for the honor.

Whether these alternatives were being considered could not be learned from the officials tonight, nor was there any comment on the possibility of selecting an all-star team.

ON THE SIDELINES

Cude Suffers Two Broken Ribs In Game

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 21—Little Will Cude played a brilliant game tonight as Canadiens defeated Montreal Maroons 2-1 in a National Hockey League match but few of the spectators who witnessed the game knew the slim Welshman played the last minute of the game with two broken ribs.

The game was held up after Hooley Smith crashed the youthful goalkeeper who came out in a diving save as the Maroons centre was through with no one to beat but the goalie. The trainer treated Cude on the ice and he finished the game.

Immediately afterwards Cude was taken to hospital and will be out of action for two weeks or more. Canadiens are trying to get either Bill Taugher of the Cleveland International Hockey League or Abbie Cox of Springfield in the Canadian-American League to fill in for the game little netminder.

Will Not Permit Amateurs And Pros To Mix

(By Arthur Merkel Canadian Press Staff Writer) HALIFAX, Nov. 21—Diehard Conservatives and tolerant Liberals staged a battle to the death on the floor of the 48th annual meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada tonight as the governing body came to a decision not to permit the intermingling of amateurs and professionals under any circumstances.

A resolution, put before the meeting by the resolution committee, to permit an amateur team to carry one professional from another sport, formed the ground of the dispute which lasted three full hours. When the final vote was taken however, after many amendments, delegates were found overwhelmingly against lowering the bars between professionals and amateurs.

One clause in an amendment proposed by Dr. A. F. Lamb of Montreal, asking that the word amateur be deleted "from the constitution, by-laws, rules and regulations" of the A. A. U. was ruled out of order by President W. A. Fry of Dunville, Ont., and no discussion allowed on the subject.

Dr. Lamb said that if any amendment to the amateur definition were attached there should be no strings attached and insisted the line between amateurism and professionalism should be clear cut and unmistakable. If his resolution were adopted, a new amateur association would have to be formed that enforced the distinction.

His amendment, the second one to the original resolution, read "that amateurs be allowed to play with and against professionals and professionals be allowed to play with and against amateurs without restriction and that the word amateur be deleted from the constitution, by-laws, rules and regulations of this body."

A vote on his amendment with the final clause deleted was defeated 170 to 40.

HALIFAX, Nov. 21—Problems disturbing the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation stepped into the annual meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada today and caused more than an hour's heated argument that almost equalled scenes at the women's convention at the beginning of the week.

Controversy churned round the recommendation of the resolutions committee to suggest "a form of modified proportional representation or some alternative plan" to the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation as a means of dealing with a system of proxies that gave Maritime Branch control of the annual women's meeting and caused Ontario and Quebec delegates to walk out in protest.

There was no discussion about whether or not Canada would participate in the Olympics. The resolutions committee said the union had given careful consideration of communications on the subject and its recommendation that "Canada follow the action of Great Britain", passed without question.

Revisals of the articles of alliance with the Amateur Snowshoe Association and rules regulating track and field meets were adopted and branches were asked to change a uniform fee of 25 cents in issuing amateur cards. Formerly as much as 50 cents had been charged by some branches.

Upsets Feature In N.H.L. As Amerks, Canucks And Black Hawks Register Wins

By Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, Nov. 21—Toronto Maple Leafs suffered their first defeat of the National Hockey League season tonight, bowing to Chicago Black Hawks 4-3 in a rousing battle before 10,000 spectators in the Stadium. The result left the Hawks in first place in the American section and the Leafs still ahead in the Canadian.

The damage was done by the Hawk line of Doc Romnes, Donnie McDonald and Paul Thompson, who scored all the Hawk goals. Thompson accounted for two, with McDonald and Romnes cashing once each. The Hawks led by 2-1 at the end of the first period, Nick Metz scoring the Leaf goal on an assist from Bill Hollett. They added two more in the second while Harvey Jackson was adding another for Toronto, and were held scoreless in the final as Jackson scored the third Leaf goal.

Goalie George Hainsworth of the Leafs suffered a long cut over his right eye in stopping a shot by McDonald in the third period, and had five stitches taken before he could resume. The accident delayed the game 13 minutes.

Two goals down starting the final period, the Leafs attacked from start to finish, only to run into a checking system that proved almost faultless. During the hectic period the N. H. L. champions were able to direct only five shots at Mike Karakas in addition to the one Harvey Jackson put into the net.

Toronto earned a wide margin in scoring chances during the first two periods, but the Hawks watched closely for chances to break away and were impressive in their drives for goals.

Wholesale Suspension Of Footballers

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Nov. 21—A knockout blow to Dominion football play-downs was handed out here today when the Ottawa branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada suspended every player who played in the inter-provincial rugby union this season and every man who played exhibition games against a big four team.

The wholesale suspension, one of the most drastic rulings ever made in Canada, was announced tonight by Gordon Young, Secretary of the local branch of the Athletic Union.

TORONTO, Nov. 21—(C. P.)—R. W. Hewitson, Secretary of the Canadian Rugby Union, expressed the opinion tonight that the Ottawa branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada had not the right to suspend athletes outside the jurisdiction of its own branch, and announced the C. R. U. play-downs would go on as scheduled.

"I don't think the Ottawa branch has authority to enforce any such blanket suspension of players," declared the C. R. U. Secretary. "That is a matter for the A. A. U. of C. and President W. A. Fry admitted only two or three days ago that he was without proof to support charges against Ottawa players."

Al Simmons May Play For World Champs

DAYTON, O., Nov. 21—A whirlpool of rumors made everyone dizzy at the minor baseball league convention today, but it was learned from reliable sources that: 1. Philadelphia Athletics had shortstop Eric McNair to Boston Red Sox and third baseman Phily Higgins to New York Yankees. 2. Bob Quinn had agreed definitely to serve as general manager of Boston Braves, who will be re-elected within the next few days on a basis that will surprise everyone. 3. Outfielder Al Simmons of Chicago White Sox will play for Detroit next year if Mickey Cochrane can sell him to Wilmer O. Briggs, now sole owner of the world's champion. 4. Jimmy Fox, star home run hitter of the Athletics, may remain in Philadelphia after all, still acting as the backbone of the club. Offsetting that information was a persistent report that Fox would go to the White Sox. The "inside" of the deals involving several of the outstanding stars of the American League was that Connie Mack at first meant to sell Cramer, McNair and Fox to the Red Sox but that other deals made offers and insisted such a deal would give too much strength to Boston. Simmons angered the White Sox a week ago when he ripped up a new contract that was offered him. He drew \$25,000 last season and the White Sox offered him but \$12,500 for 1936. Manager Jimmy Dykes admitted all this and freely predicted that Simmons would be playing for the Tigers next year. With Simmons on the move, the report that Chicago would get Fox gained wide circulation, but no one would lend any credence to it.

Roth Will Meet Klick In Bout Tonight

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 21—Al Roth, sensational young New York lightweight who raved the old maestro, champion Tony Canzoneri, such a rousing time of it a few weeks ago, goes out tomorrow night to earn himself another shot at the 135-pound diadem.

Roth has been matched with Frankie Klick, San Francisco veteran, in the 10-round main bout of a lightweight show in Madison Square Garden. The winner has been promised a fight with Lou Ambers, for the right to challenge Canzoneri.

Klick has long been troubled by the championship bee. He lost to Barney Ross in Miami last winter, but believes he can hurdle both Roth and Ambers and thus force Canzoneri to recognize him as the no one challenger.

Lou Lombardi, Edgewater, N. J., puncher, faces Leo Rodin of Chicago, in the 10-round semi-final.

Amerks Obtain Wiseman From Red Wings

NEW YORK, Nov. 21—New York Americans of the National Hockey League announced the acquisition today of Eddie Wiseman, right wingman of Detroit Red Wings. Wiseman was obtained in exchange for Fred Ferges, a forward on the Americans' International League farm team in Rochester, and \$7,500 cash. The new forward will report Saturday. Wiseman has been with the Red Wings for the past two seasons.

Olympics Defeat Falcons 3-0

DETROIT, Nov. 21—Detroit Olympics took undisputed possession of first place in the western division of the International Hockey League tonight by shutting out Cleveland Falcons 3-0 before a crowd of 5,000. The home team was vastly superior to the Falcons. Carl Liscombe bagged Detroit's first goal in the opening period on a double pass from Will Starr and Eddie Wiseman. The O's forced the play throughout the fast session and the forwards back-checked so capably that the defence was seldom in trouble.

Wiseman and Burr Williams added tallies in the second period. The speedy Wiseman, formerly of the Red Wings, raced in for his scoring shot after snapping up a pass from Liscombe. Yip Foster helped Williams with his tally, the two defencemen engineering a rush.

A motion was placed before the meeting by the registration committee on advice of the finance committee establishing a standard cost.

President W. E. Fry of Dunville, Ont., praised the resolution, stating that the problem has been "a bone of contention for years" and should be settled.

It was not just, he said, that excessive fees should be charged on one play, while just across a line a fee only half as large was paid.
